When asked where he obtained his line for use in his book-			
making activities and after much discussion			
stated he obtained the line from known Dallas bookmaker			
PHILIP S. BOSCO (DL 92-331). stated he would,			
at any time, sit down and talk to Bureau Agents about his			
knowledge of gambling activities in Dallas as he claimed			
he was probably the one person in the area who was acquainted			
with all bookmakers and gamblers. He stated, however, that		-	
he would not furnish current information about the activities			
of other heatmakers as he felt this would make him a Material			1

in the Dallas area at the present time stating that STONE		-	
got this position when Dallas was closed down in the early			
fifties and all bookmakers went out of business except STONE.			
He identified LITTLE, BOSCO, WINFREY and ALBERT MEADOWS			
(DL 162-109) as probably the most active bookmakers in the			
Dallas area today.

At a time when the interview was about to be terminated MATTHEWS appeared at apartment accompanied by his daughter. MATTHEWS appeared very surprised to find FBI Agents at the apartment.

The information obtained from was orally furnished to Lt. JACK REVILL, Intelligence Section, Dallas Police Department and Deputy Sheriff BOB MORGAN, Intelligence Section, Dallas Sheriff's Office on 11/28/62.

RE: WILLIAM HOWARD COOPER IGA (DL 162-208)

On 11/27/62 COOPER was interviewed by Bureau Agents at his club located at 2138 Fort Worth Avenue, Dallas. It was observed by the Agents that this is a small private club with a bar, dance floor and pool tables. COOPER appeared to be very nervous throughout the interview. stated that only members are allowed in the club although it was noted that the Bureau Agents entered without being challenged or asked for identification. COOPER claimed membership cost \$10 per year. He provided a book containing the names of his members which was checked by the interviewing Agents, however, no familiar names were noted. COOPER readily admitted he had a prior arrest record in Houston, Texas for operating a policy racket but vehemently denied that since coming to Dallas he has been involved in any gambling activity. He admitted a close association with Houston hoodlum TONY VALONE. He stated he moved to Dallas about four or five years ago and has been operating his present club during that time. He stated he formerly had a club in Grand Prairie, Texas, called the Canopy but had to sell it because he was losing money.

On 11/28/62 PCI (DL 137-946) advised that immediately following ETCHIESON's recent release from the

county jail where he had spent considerable time awaiting a decision on his appeal, ETCHIESON and his girl friend, ELIZABETH ANN HEDLUND came to PCI and pawned about \$1,100 worth of jewelry. PCI stated that while ETCHIESON was in jail HEDLUND and another of his prostitutes PAULA CAROL CLARK had obtained frequent loans from PCI to pay ETCHIESON's attorneys. PCI stated that in total there was approximately \$2,100 worth of jewelry pawned but all of it was legitimate as he had had it checked by the Dallas Police Department.

The above information was orally furnished to Lt. REVILL and Deputy MORGAN on 11/28/62.

RE: ALBERT MEADOWS, aka. IGA (DL 162-109)

On 11/26/62 Bureau Agents went to the residence of LUKE HUGHES, Mesquite, Texas. (Previous investigation had determined that numerous phone calls have been made from MEADOWS' place of operation in Arlington, Texas to the telephone listed to HUGHES). HUGHES was not home but his wife advised that she was not acquainted with the subject or any of his associates. She claimed she had no knowledge concerning the telephone calls and then advised that her husband obtained his income through oil leases and through playing golf at the Tennison Golf Course, Dallas. (Previous investigation had ascertained that numerous Dallas gamblers hang out at this golf course and make an income through gambling on golf matches.)

On 11/28/62 golf professional at Tennison and a confidential source of the Dallas Office (protect identity) identified HUGHES as a "small time bettor" who plays golf frequently at Tennison's with known gambler CLARK "ACE" DARNELL.

On 11/27/62 HUGHES contacted the Dallas Office and advised he would be available for an interview by FBI Agents at the office of his attorney. When told that
