SYNOPSIS:

Information regarding birth, education and commercial activities of JOHN F. SURCLIPPE set forth. SURCLIPPE, owner and operator of The New Yorker S. A.," mens' clothing store, Mexico City, denied he has had further contact with members of GUZIK Nob or has intentions of future contact with them. No derogatory information received regarding SURCLIPPE nor information received reflecting continued activity in Mexico City on part of GUZIX Nob.

INVESTIGATIVE PETATISE

According to information received from reliable Source C, JOHN F. SUICLIFFS was born on Pebruary 5, 1909 in Mexico City of Mnglish parents. According to this source, SUTCLIFFE has retained his British citizenship. Also, according to this source, SUTCLIFFE attended the New York Electrical School in 1931 and later studied in Toronto, Canada, where he was graduated as an electrical engineer. He practiced his profession in New York City but at the beginning of 1933 he returned to Mexico City and established a shop for mens' articles at Madero 57. Later this shop was operated under the name of "the New Yorker, S. A." of which SUTCLIFFE is both president and manager. According to Source C, SUICLIFFE also has at Madero 28 en additional business which is called "Representaciones Mundiales, S. de R. L. y C. V." He is a stock holder in additional local companies, but he devotes the major part of his time to "The New Yorker, S. A." The principal business of "The New Yorker, S. A." is the importation and selling of mens' articles, for which the business has a very good local reputation. According to this same source, the "New Yorker" has assets of 200,000 pesos. SUTCLIFFE is stated to also have additional sums invested in real estate including a house et Reformo 220.

Reliable Source D advised that in a recent conversation with JOHN F. SUICLIFFE, SUICLIFFE stated that he has had
