Mark Lane

In August, 1967, a confidential source, contact with whom has not been sufficient to judge reliability, advised that "Kram" was the KGB code name for Mark Lane, a lawyer and the author of a recent book critical of the Warren Commission findings on the assassination of President Kennedy. This source stated that Boris Orekhov, a KGB officer assigned to the New York Residency had had two meetings with Lane and had established a trusted relationship with him. The source advised that Lane had made a trip to Europe and after his return to the United States was not contacted. The source stated that the New York Residency of the KGB had established "conditions of meetings" with Kram. (5)

The above source aldo furnished a KGB document entitled "List of American Sociologists" part of which pertained to Mark Lane as follows: "Mark Lane = Member of New York State Assembly, 10th District of New York; attorney. He is a young man (age 30) and a Jew. He is sharply opposed to the policies of Tammany Hall and favors a new leadership for the Democratic Party in New York. He has come out against racial discrimination (very sharply). He has organized a group of 'freedom riders', wisited the southern states, was arrested and sentenced to two months imprisonment. He has been freed under bail. He is an advocate of Ghandi's passive resistance although he is not inclined to submissiveness".

The "New York World Telegram", a former New York City Daily newspaper, issue of May 25, 1962, page 12, identified Mark Lane as a New York State Assemblyman, representing the 10th Assembly District, New York City.

The "New York Post", daily newspaper, New York City, issue of May 25, 1962, page 4, reflected that Mark Lane would give up his seat in the New York State Assembly after having served in that capacity for fifteen months. He would not seek a second term.
