Immediately after dropping its deathly cargo the plane disappeared in the direction it had come from. () "On the 26th, United States Cable Agencies released the news that a United States citizen, Alexander Rorke, had declared to newspapermen in Washington that he rode in the twin-engine plane which bombed the refinery and that another of the Americans who participated in the attack was a student at the Massachusetts Institute of Rechnology. (& "The absolute impunity that this plane was able to leave and then return to United States territory and the subsequent declaration made in the very capital of the United States of America by one of its crew members, plus the fact so far no action is known to have been taken by the authorities of that country. Prove that the North American Covernment cannot escape responsibility. for these acts which would have caused civilian casualties had the Tobjective been accomplished./ "The circumstances and the manner in which this aggression was carried out demonstrate that the decisions announced publicly by the United States of America apparently made to prevent provocatory activities against Cuba on the part of the counterrevolutionary pirates, are disregarded in a manner that cannot be excused.
