Contact with above sources was temporarily discontinued on 1/24/66 for security reasons involving local changes in postal personnel.

Current inquiry reveals that while the physical plant and postal schedules are unchanged from period of prior contact with sources, the security risk remains.

While it is realized these sources furnished valuable information to the Federal Government, it is not believed the value justifies the risk involved. It is not recommended that contact with sources be re-established.

Translations are furnished San Francisco which in turn paraphrases data and disseminates to interested field offices. PURPOSE: Program is designed to identify individe uals in U. s. who because of contacts with inividuals in Communic Ch: constitute possible threat to U. S. SCOPE: Frogram is field wide, however, most investigations are conducted by offices covering large Chinese populations. TIE IN WITH OTHER PROCRAMS: Information emanating from the source reaches all areas of (Chinese) investigations. CASE LOAD: Thirty-eight cases are preently in pending status. Ten cases have been closed since 1/8/64. COST Source is not paid and investigations resulting from this program are absorbed by agents current handling security matters. PAST OR PRESENT WAKNESSES: Source operates on secure basis. San Francisco is aware if security becomes an issue Bureau is to be advised immediately and operation discontinued until security can be guaranteed. ADMINISTRATIVE COTROL: San Francisco furnishes other divisions with information obtained from this operation and furnishes instructions for handling an investigation. San Francisco has responsibility for deciding security classification to be placed for information furnished by source. Bureau is advised of results of /aliinquiries resulting from this operation. AMOUACIES AND CURRENTIESS INSTRUCTIONS: Instructions regarding material furnished by source are current and adequate. OVER-ALL VALUE: Source makes availabelarge volume of valuable 32 not otherwise available. It has identified thenty individuals in U. S. subscribers to Peking Review," a Chinese Communist-English-language magazine and numerous subscribers to other (Chinese) publications. identified 148 persons dealing with China Books and Periodicals, a bookstore owned and operated by Communist Party member in San Francisco registered with Department as agent of Communist China. Source furnished information regarding number of instances of collection of scientific and technical, data from U. S. by Communist China. Source disclosed a Chipese in Communist China, former U. S. student, University of Purdue, for first time in twelve years contacted former classmate, an employee of Radio Corporation of America with access to classified information. In addition, source furnished at a regarding fifteen individuals currently under investigation. Source also obtained identity of approximately sixty individuals in Brazil subscribers to Chinese Communist propaganda magazine. OPTATION OF SOURCE: Agents who handle Chiprop, another sensitive operation whereby we have access to mail emanating from Communist China destined for individuals in U. S., handle captioned operation. Translations of Chinese language material furnished by source are reviewed at Eureau and names are searched for main files and/or espionage references. Because of lack of identifying data no other references are reviewed as further investigation, if remitred, mill disclose background data facilitating more thorough search of Eureau records. Espionage references are reviewed even though it may not be possible to make an immediate identification as such data may be important for consideration by field.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. If you approve source will be evaluated annually and memorandum submitted each May 15, at which time careful consideration will be given to productivity and adequacies of administrative control.

2. Attached for approval is letter to San Francisco instructive Chiclet operation continue to be handled under same administrative controls which apply to Chiprop. In order that Eureau may periodically evaluate Chiclet and insure that its continued operation is justified, San Francisco Will be instructed to furnish summary of significant accomplishments for prior six-month period to reach Bureau April 15, and October 15.

While it is recognized proposed coverage necessitates use of unusual amount of manpower, its potential to penetrate Chinese Communist intelligence activities in U. S. requires exploration. If successful, program will more than justify use of contemplated manpower.

RECOMMENDATION:

If approved, San Francisco will be instructed to promptly place in effect/coverage of/mail destined for Hong Kong and Communist China for period of three months. At end of three months San Francisco will submit recommendations re continuation.

Careful consideration has been given to recommendations furnished by you in relet with regard to captioned subject. The Bureau has decided that it is not warranted at this time to expand our present coverage to include all available contacts among the Chinese in Canada and U.S.

The volume of translation resulting from such additional coverage would necessitate Bureau employing at least one more full-time Chinese translator. Such an expense cannot be justified based on results of this coverage to date. Bureau has reviewed 83 items submitted by your office furnished by captioned source and translated by Chinese-language Bureau translators. Of these, 79 were merely contacts among Chinese in Canadaland Chinese in U. S. exchanging personal news, the remaining four included letters from individuals in Communist China to Chinese in U. S. However, these, too, were devoted to personal information.

The Bureau has no objection to your using this source in obtaining information in specific cases such as the ones cited in relet nor will the Bureau object to translating items available to this source which you consider should be translated in order that the best interests of the Bureau may be served. However, when submitting items for translation, other than those relating to specific cases, set forth in the cover communication reasons for submitting such items for translation.

You indicated in relet that you believe Chinese.
Communists send propaganda into U. S. via Canada in order to circumvent U. S. regulations regarding such propaganda. Based lon this assumption, you further conclude that this line of communication will be used for espionage communications. In the event you receive positive indications of such espionage

communications furnish Bureau complete details and consideration will be given to expanding coverage available through captioned source. Do not initiate such general coverage without first obtaining specific Bureau authority.

NOTE: CS SF 2279-S*, a highly confidential source of San Francisco Office, furnishes information regarding letters exanating from Communist China and destined for individuals in U. S. Majority of such information is in Chinese Manguage. San Francisco furnishes Photostats of these letters to Bureau where they are translated. Translations are then returned to San Francisco and San Francisco has responsibility of paraphrasing this information to protect source, and furnishing information to appropriate field offices for additional investigation. San Francisco letter 1-19-61 advised another highly confidential source had been developed which could furnish similar information re/Chinese in Canada contacting Chinese in U. S. Majority of this information would also be in Chinese language and would require translation at Bureau. Bulet 2-3-61 instructed San Francisco to furnish Bureau more information re this new source (captioned subject) and specifically indicate value of such coverage. San Francisco letter 2=13-61 advised that the presence of pro-Chinese Communist individuals in Canada indicated need for such coverage. San Francisco pointed out/Chinese Communists/could conceivably contact individuals in the U.S. via Canada for espionage purposes. Also pointed out several specific cases regarding individuals in Canadatwhose activities are of interest to the Bureau and these cases could receive additional coverage through captioned source. We have received information concerning Chinese educated in the United States who have returned to (Communist China) and in these cases, we have been able to identify the type of scientific work in which these individuals are engaged. past six months, source has noted a considerable increase in complaints emanating from Chinese in vastly separated areas regarding deplorable economic conditions. Lost prevalent complaint is that food is extremely difficult to obtain, and as a result, many (Chinese) are suffering from malnutrition and other maladies resulting from lack of nutritious foods. As a result of food shortage, numerous (Hong Kong) firms have been established to forward food packages to individuals in (Communist China) from everseas (hinese) Food is in such short cumply in (hina) that even if an individual has money, he is unable to find food to purchase. This deplorable state has been verified in communications written by diplomatic personnel who are assigned to Communist China. These individuals uniformly detest their assignment and eagerly await reassignment. Source furnishes lists of subscribers in United States to (Chinese Communist) magazines published in (China.) We also receive current information regarding identities, locations, and political beliefs of former (Korean prisoners of war who decided to remain in China.

Source has identified numerous (Caucasians) traveling in (Communist China,) and such information in the case of United States citizens or permanent resident aliens in United States has been made available to State Department. Bureau has been able to identify scientists in the United States who maintain contact with United States educated (Chinese) scientists who have returned to China. From these contacts, we have been able to establish the particular types of scientific information (Chinese Communists are endeavoring to obtain. Information from this source has made it clear (Chinese Communists) are maintaining a continuing pressure on (Chinese) scientists in the United States to return to (Communist China). Source recently furnished names and addresses of individuals in the United States receiving pornographic material from Communist China, and appropriate field offices have been notified. Source identified a United States citizen, (a Cuban) who formerly resided in New York City and who is

San Francisco at frequent intervals reviews information furnished by source and reduces pertinent items of interest to other Government agencies to letterhead memoranda which are furnished Bureau and subsequently disseminated.

CONTEMPLATED ACTION:

This program will be continued without change.

OPERATION OF SOURCE:

Agents handling this operation daily process approximately 13,500 first-class items, and this is done within two two-hour periods. Because of security consideration involved, number of personnel engaged in this operation is held to absolute minimum. Agents extract approximately one hundred items a day for consideration and possible further action. San Francisco furnishes field divisions only material which can be considered as having potential intelligence value.

Transliterations of Chinese language material emanating from source are reviewed at Bureau, and names are searched for main file or espionage references. In view of characteristic lack of identifying data, no other references are reviewed as, if information requires further investigation, such inquiry will disclose background data which will enable us to determine whether Bureau records contain information identifiable with individual concerning whom source has furnished data. Lain files are searched in order that copies of transliterations may be placed in such files. Espionage references are reviewed, even though it may not be possible to effect an immediate identification, in order that field will be provided such data which may or may not be identical with individuals concerning whom source has furnished information.

RECOLE ENDATION:

Procedures for handling this program be reviewed in six months to determine if any changes are necessary.

The following data is being furnished to the Bureau concerning the operation of this source:

The operation of this source is secure from all standpoints at this time. If this security becomes an issue at any time in the future, the Bureau will be immediately notified and the source will be discontinued until such time as its security can be guaranteed.

As the Bureau is well aware, this source furnishes a magnitude of vital information pertaining to activities within (Red China) including its economical and industrial achievements. For instance, during the past six months, this source continued to furnish information relating to U.S. educated Chinese who have since returned to (Red China) and identified their current positions in their respective fields of science. This source also reveals the intimate feelings which these Chinese scientists have concerning life in China) as well as their pros and cons concerning life and science in general, while studying and residing in the U.S. A true picture of life in China) today is also related by the information which this source furnishes reflecting life in general to be horrible due to the lack of proper food, housing, clothes, equipment, and the complete disregard of a human person's individual rights.

Source still continues to furnish up-to-date news on the former Korean prisoners of war (turncoats) and their true feelings, both pro-Chinese communist and anti-US, as well as their future plans. Source reveals the identity of their friends in the U.S., as well as the current activities and residences of these (turncoats) who have since returned from (China) to the U.S.

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Source has furnished complete subscription lists of various Chinese communist publications, including China Reconstructs," "Peking Review," "China Literature" and other leading pro-Chinese communist publications which are published in Hong Kong, B.C.C. In this regard, source furnishes identities of those individuals residing in the U.S. who act as agents for these Chinese communist publications.

Source still continues to furnish up-to-date news concerning American citizens who have profchinese communist sympathies residing on the Mainland of China. These Americans in some way are employed by the Chinese Communist Government and in particular, the source was able to locate the current whereabouts of one VIRGINIUS FRANK COE, New York espionage subject, who has been missing since about (1956) This source continues to furnish pertinent information also relative to the activities and writings of ANNA LOUISE STRONG and her fight to have the U.S. recognize Red China.

many U.S. citizens who have violated the U.S. passport laws by having actually traveled to and throughout (Red China.)

Source continually identifies certain U.S. scientists who are on friendly terms with U.S. educated Chinese scientists who have since returned to China and at the same time, makes available certain requests which these Chinese scientists make of their scientific friends in the U.S. In certain instances, the Bureau has been able to develop potential double agents in the Chinese security field, because of these requests made by these Chinese scientists and in particular, San Francisco makes reference to the case of DR. Y.P. SUN a research chemist for Shell Development Corporation, Modesto, California) It also assists in evaluating the reliability of double agents as in the case of RAYMOND TOW (who has been approached by representatives of the New China News Agency) In (TOM's) case, this source has been able to corroborate information which (TOM) has furnished the Bureau.

In the counterintelligence field, this source continues to monitor correspondence to one (JAMES CHAO) who resides in Ann Arbor, Michigan it being pointed out that (CHAO) was alleged to be an actual agent for the Eank of China, which is a (Chinese) communist front.

Considerable data has been uncovered concerning pro-Chinese communist sympathies on the part of U.S. Government employees, thus causing the field and the Eureau to initiate 140 SGE cases. (SF 1132) PH/1s

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This source enables San Francisco to keep up with the current residences and employments of various San Francisco securit and SI subjects and at the same time, source furnishes the view-points which these Subjects have concerning Red China as well as their anti-US statements which they have made.

Source has uncovered the whereabouts of a Selective Service subject of the San Francisco Division, namely T'ONG Hing-yip, who recently graduated from the University of Peking after being missing from the San Francisco area for several years.

In other instances, this source has revealed several Chinese security subjects to be now residing on the Mainland of China and attending institutions of higher learning even though US passports for these individuals have not been issued.

Source has identified certain U.S. scientists who have traveled to Moscow as well as European countries, to attend various scientific conferences there. During these conferences, some of these U.S. scientists have become quite friendly with Chinese scientists and have initiated correspondence. Although some of these U.S. scientists have been contacted by the field relative to their willingness to cooperate in the double-agent field. San Francisco has no knowledge concerning the outcome.

Source still continues to furnish pertinent information relating to various (CIA) subjects which information has been disseminated. Many of the U.S. educated (Chinese) scientists have been approached by (CIA's covert operation in San Francisco) to act as double agents by that/agency.)

Source continually shows the techniques and pressure put on Chinese scientists remaining in the U.S. in order to force them to return to China and work for the motherland. In this regard, source has given the U.S. valuable information concerning the advancement which the Chinese communists have made in certain scientific fields.

Source still continues to identify numerous U.S. citizens who are in contact with various Hong Kong pro-Chinese communist publishing firms.

It has also furnished correct Chinese family names, which reflect that Chinese individuals are residing in the U.S. fraudulently and has also furnished "coaching papers" for individual to use. It has also furnished data as to how finances may be sent to Communist China through drops in Hong Kong and has also furnished information relative to the manner in which individuals are able to leave Communist China which has been of assistance in evaluating the stories which recent immigrants furnish during the course of interviews by Bureau agents.

Numerous potential security informants have been developed due to the type of information which this source has furnished in San Francisco.

Uponreceipt of the translations of the Chinese material which is forwarded to the Bureau, as well as an evaluation made of the English language material, which is photostated, San Francisco furnishes to the other field divisions only that material which can be construed as having intelligence value. In manyinstances, San Francisco has knowledge concerning the identities of security subjects residing within other field divisions and furnishes pertinent data concerning these individuals. Numerous requests are made by certain Chinese scientists to forward to them certain technical books and publications in the scientific field which information is also furnished to other field divisions.

In the case of (Caucasians) traveling throughout (Red China) who may possibly be U.S. citizens, this data is also furnished to other offices.

At this time, this source as a general rule has access to all mail emanating from Hong Kong, B.C.C. and Communist Chine destined for the U.S; however, on certain occasions, this source, due to the routing of mail by the Post Office from the Airport, sometimes misses certain mail bags.

For the Bureau's information, San Francisco processes approximately 13,500 first class letters a day not including third class publications. In this connection, however, it is noted that the processing must be done in a very limited time, two hours maximum. Furthermore, in view of the existing limitations, the quantity of material chosen for complete translation is necessarily limited to no more than 50 per day, some of which as further time permits for a closer scrutiny, is later disregarded and no further action taken, other than returning the material to the source.

Powers stated that he subsequently received a call from the Chief Post Office Inspector who told him that he would not be able to make such arrangements and explained that something had happened in Washington on a similar matter and that Bureau Headquarters should take up the matter with Post Office Headquarters here in Washington. - 1. The intercept project that has been explained orally to (Mr. Papich) will be referred to as in correspondence Act 6 (1) between the Federal Bureau of Investigation and this Agency.
- 2. This explanatory memorandum constitutes HUNTER Report #1. Future disseminations will be numbered consecutively.
 - 3. In submitting possible traces on individuals of interest to you, reports will be submitted in the following form:
 - a. If the individual named in the intercept appears to be identical with the individual of interest to you, you will be furnished a reproduction of the exterior, and of the contents if the item has been opened.
 - b. If the individual named in the intercept is only possibly identical with the individual of interest to you, only machine run listing of the items will be submitted. In such cases a reproduction of the exterior and of the contents, if the item has been opened, will be available upon request.
 - 4. In order to facilitate your reading of machine run entries, there follows an explanation of the various types of replies which you will receive in connection with requests. A hypothetical request for any addressee in the U.S. of mail from P. KROVAN, whose location is believed to be in Moscow, might result in the following reply:

"A" has no present meaning. All numbers are now preceded by "A" only to-allow for future additional classifications. None are presently contemplated.

"57CO5'is the date of intercept, namely: "57" is the year. "C" indicates the month. The code key for months is set out as Enclosure 1. "05" is the day of the month. Thus, "57C05" is 5 March 1957.

The group "C3325" is our own internal filing number.

The ''Name In' entry identifies the correspondent inside the USSR.

The asterisk in "Ref" column indicates that KROVAN sent the letter.

The entry in "Loc" (ation) column indicates the area or city inside the Soviet Union from which the letter was mailed. In this case it was mailed from the western section of Ukrainian SSR. The code key used for this column is set out in Enclosure 2. This code key is to be used for all items prior to 1 January 1958, on which date a 4-place code was instituted in order to designate more precisely the localities within the USSR. A copy of this new code is enclosed as Enclosure 3.

The "Name Out" entry identifies the correspondent outside the USSR In both the "Name In" and "Name Out" columns, the last or family name is listed first.

The absence of an asterisk in the "Ref" column after EVOSWA indicates that she is the recipient of the letter.

The entry in the second "Loc" (ation) column indicates the state of the U.S. (in this case, New Jersey) to which the letter was addressed. The code key used for this column is set out in Enclosure 4. You will note that some 3-digit entries indicate large cities within a state, thus KO indicates New York State and KOA indicates New York City. For your convenience an alphabetical list of the states with their code indicator is set out in Enclosure 5.

The absence of an "X" in the "Ban" column means that the letter was not opened and that only the exterior is recorded in our files.

- 5. Since the hypothetical request was for mail from (P. KROVAN, who is believed to be located in Moscow) only the listing as set out above would be furnished, since it would not appear that Paraskoviya KROVAN, located in the western section of the (Ukrainian SSR) is identical. If in connection with future investigation or information otherwise available, you may believe that (KROVAN) may be identical with the individual of interest to you, you need reference only the HUNTER report number and request the exterior photographs of item No. A57C05C3325, which will be reproduced from the original film and made available to you.
- 6. If the hypothetical request is for any mail from the Soviet Union to Rose ESTERSON, who resides in Chicago, the reply might be as follows:

The difference in this listing from that previously illustrated is as follows:

"U" is our internal identifying designator. The first date is the date of the intercept. The second date is the date of the communication inside the letter. The "X" under the "Ban" column indicates the letter was opened. Again this indicator would indicate only a possible identification since KKB under "Loc" indicates California. In this instance upon request, identifying the HUNTER report number and referencing both A57D23U and 57D18 numbers, the outer envelopes and their contents will be reproduced and furnished to you.

- 7. Normal service of either of the above requests will be 24 hours. In an emergency we could service the request in a few minutes.
- 8. If your first request had been for KROVAN, or P. KROVAN, or Paraskoviya KROVAN located in the western section of the Ukrainian SSR you would have initially received the photograph of the envelope. Likewise, in the second instance, if your request had

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been for ESTERSON, or R. ESTERSON, or Rose ESTERSON located in Chicago, or Illinois, you would initially have received photographed copies of the envelope and its contents.

In order to insure most efficient servicing of your request, it is suggested that you submit trace requests as follows: List the last name first with any known first and given names or initials, and address including state, city and street, if known. If an exact address is not known, a probable state or section will be helpful but is not required. The same would apply to the USSR The above should be listed on duplicate 3 x 5 cards. If only a phonetic name is known, various combinations of spellings would be appreciated, together with any other data such as probable address or area. Where an address is known and there are individuals, other than the subject, at this address to whom the questioned communication might be addressed, their names should also be given. For record purposes and in order to facilitate our answers to your request, would you in turn number each card as Request No.

10. On each request will you also indicate whether the request is for a one-time check or whether the name should be put on the Watch List. If the latter, please indicate the duration of the Watch List, i.e. 30, 60, 90 days, or "until cancelled". If a Watch List is requested, you should also indicate the treatment desired when a possible hit is made, i.e. photograph outside only; photograph outside and contents; photograph outside, contents, and examine for S/W or microdots. Specifically indicate any Watch List item which should not be opened. In this connection you may also desire to give us a white list of correspondents of interest to you who are not Watch List subjects but whose mail should not be opened in the course of our normal openings for spot-checking for operational or intelligence information. In some instances you may desire to indicate that you are to be informed immediately when a hit is made and prior to the receipt of the letter by the addressee.

II. It is possible to make a special machine run of the names of all correspondents either addressor, addressee, or both, from any specific area in the (USSR) to the United States or to any specific state or city in the U.S., or vice versa. There are various other combinations that could be run, such as all letters mailed in Florida either on a specific date or for any given period. If the above-listed

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or any other type of exploratory processing is desired, a presentation of the problem will enable us to tell you immediately what we can do, how long it will take, and the amount of work that is involved. While this type of service is possible, it does involve a great deal of work and should be requested in connection with very important cases only.

This could culminate in recommendations for interview to clarify certain points not established by investigation and to determine whether the present activities of the subject are inimical to the best interests of the U.S., provided available infor mation does not dictate against such interview and provided the interview can be conducted without compromising (Bureau Informant 200)



From 8-14-65 through 8-13-66, 3028 Hunter Reports transmitting 6077 items were received from (Bureau Informant This is a slight increase (almost 3%) in number of items over the previous year.

Although items were received on a continuous basis, the number dropped during the period of August, 1965, through January, 1966. This is believed to be due to the reorganization trans, fer of personnel and change in supervision over the

From February, 1966, to the present, there has been a marked increase in number of items received. The average for the past four months has been 627 per month, whereas the average for the same period last year was 421. There has been no significant change in the type of material except that more items are being received regarding subjects on whom the source has not furnished information previously, necessitating more The value of this material is shown by the fact that there was an increase of 53% in number of new cases opened on the basis of information furnished by the source.

Approximately 580 letters were written on information furnished by Bureau Informant 200) during the past year. is an increase of approximately 9% over those written the previous year. More than 260 new cases were opened and 96 cases were reopened. The majority of new cases were opened on the basis of travel to the (USSR) and contacts of U.S. citizens, Latin Americans and (Cubans) in the U.S. with individuals in the (USSR) Information was sent to the field to assist in pending investigations and for information. In some cases, data was extracted from several items, summarized and sent to the field in one communication under more than one caption to show relationships between various subjects.

After an extensive review of 2500 Reports since our last memo captioned as above and dated 8/21/02, we have made the following observations in the interest of economy in regard to Project Hunter as it related to our Bureau and your Agency to insure time will not be unnecessarily expended by our Bureau processing unwanted material and to save your Agency the expense involved in the preparation of such material.

I Traffic Which Holds No Interest:

A great deal of material furnished by the informant relates directly to contacts and activities of individuals who are of current interest to us such as top level communists as William Z. Foster and Elizabeth Gurley Flynn and such espionage subjects as the Maurice Hyman Halperins, who were identified by Elizabeth Bentley, who Stated Maurice Halperin was a source of Nathan Gregory Silvermaster. The Halperins are now in Russia) Pertinent information relating to individuals of current interest is passed to the field for its intelligence interest. In addition, material is received which reveals the Soviet sympathies of some U.S. citizens and also indicates certain arrangements with the Soviets which may be considered against the best interests of the U.S. Government. The larger amount of data received tends to confirm information already known and it does not require in itself that the field be advised of same.

The informant furnished two specific reflecting that two different individuals were (sending post cards to USSR with another post card deliberately and carefully sealed to the first post card. In a case opened entitled "V. Podgoretsky, IS - R" (105-98499), the informant advised that both of the post cards forwarded by Podgoretsky contained a clandestine message on the inner side of the back post card. He was advised we have derived nothing to date from this material as we are solely interested in the individuals involved and in order to protect this highly sensitive informant we do not route the informant's material around for general intelligence interest. Mr. Hunt) was advised all of the informant's material is handled on a strictly need-to-know basis and the material retained is under strict control. (ir. Hunt) was pleased in regard to our secure precautions as only a very few CIA people have any knowledge of In regard to (Intourist) traffic, (Mr. Hunt) advised we were furnished same because one of the individuals associated with an (Intourist) agency was suspected of being a (Soviet) intelligence contact. (Mr. Hunt) agreed with our observation that all Americans traveling abroad had to obtain a passport from State Department, such travel to the (USSR) being permissible, we could obtain any necessary data re an individual from State. In regard to item number three above, it was agreed we would not receive any more re Exchange Students, Act 6 (1) Yladimir Kazakevich (who alone provided 300 items in 1960) and Intourist) traffic. In addition "holiday greeting" type traffic will not be furnished. Specific exceptions to the above-mentioned traffic we will not receive are set out in our blind memorandum to CIA and were set out in the referenced memorandum on pages 2 and 3.

The matter of receipt of illegible material was also discussed and it was pointed out to Mr. Hunt) no matter how important the contents may be if the name and address of the U.S. addressee or addressor is illegible the material is of no value. It was specifically requested more legible material be furnished and, if it was obvious reproduction would be poor, we would appreciate it if U.S. person's name and address could be printed or written out. (Mr. Hunt) advised they were aware of reproduction problem and stated Xerox equipment was to be installed in the near future. This, he believed, would help the problem.

In regard to the CIA Watch List, approximately 535 names now appear on this list which is supplemented each Monday morning. Mr. Hunt requested we specifically place on this list the individuals on whom we want coverage even though we are presently receiving items re these persons. If their names appear on the Watch List, we will possibly get closer coverage. Attached with the blind memorandum for CIA is a list of individuals presently on the Watch List which (Mr. Hunt) requested. Interested supervisors will be advised and additional names of Communist Party members now in Soviet-bloc countries will be furnished CIA via our Liaison Agent.

In regard to CIA's sampling of certain types of traffic and furnishing same to us. (Mr. Hunt) was requested to advise our Liaison Agent what it was doing and after a period of six months we would furnish the results of our observations which would dictate whether we would continue to receive this new type material.

Stewart, and representatives of CIA in regard to Bureau Informant 200. As a result, was recently Act 6 (1)(B) furnished a guide as to Bureau Informant material we desire. This guide was prepared after discussion with several members of the Espionage, Nationalities Intelligence, Subversive Control, and Internal Security Sections. In addition, was furnished Act 6 (1)(B) a current list of names previously placed on the Watch List Act 6 (1)(B) by us. In this regard, the CIA representative advised that, although we are getting coverage on certain individuals, to insure we get complete coverage on each individual we desire it on, they should be specifically added to the Watch List. This Watch List is revised each Monday; therefore, any person not included on this list at present can be included by forwarding a routing slip anytime to (W. D. Stewart, Room 644 RB) bearing the individual's name, his address in U.S., and indicating the period coverage is desired. A list will be compiled by (Ur. Stewart) weekly and furnished to CIA via liaison. REC- 47 /1/2 - G = 0 X RECOMMENDATION: That the above information be discussed, at the next conference held by the Espionage, National ties Intelligence, Subversive Control, and the Internal Security Sections and that all agents in the above-mentioned sections be reminded to furnish (Mr. Stewart) a copy of any letter prepared from Bureau Informant 200 material to assist him in continually evaluating the program.

S. person may be serving as a Soviet courier; data indicating the existence of particular (Russian) social and art clubs in the U. S.; data indicating a desire of U. S. students to study in USSR; data indicating pro Castro sympathies of U. S. persons; data revealing present activity, feelings, and former associates of Bernon Ferguson Mitchell and William Hamilton Martin, recent National Security Agency (NSA) defectors; data revealing U. S. military personnel are in contact with official establishments and/or individuals in (USSR) data revealing activities of the Maurice Hyman Halperins, now residing in Cuba) and of their son David Carlos Halperin, a medical student at the University of Chicago and data indicating current whereabouts of Carl and Alice Jerome, Communist Party subjects; and data relating to the current whereabouts of James M. McMillin, Jr., a former U. S. soldier attached to U. S. Embassy, Moscow, Russia, who previously defected and married a Soviet)

Data of Special -Interest:

During the present (Cuban) crisis, we have identified several pro-Castro) sympathizers in U. S. through their contacts with (Cubans) at (Friendship University, Moscow) and have been alerted to their activity. We have learned that (Russian) school authorities are greatly displeased with (Huldah S. Clark, daughter of Negro Communist Party subject William Clark of Newark) because of her behavior. She too evidenced discontentment there. Her educational trip to (USSR) served as CP propaganda. We were alerted to (Maurice Halperins) intended return to U. S. We have been advised of (Lillie Mae Teslich's) intended visit to (USSR). Her daughter in (Moscow) is suspected as being the propaganda-radio announcer (Moscow Molly.) We are developing U. S. contacts of Helen Kagen-Pozner, UN) employee discharged in 1950's for failure to answer questions re possible espionage involvement, through correspondence of her with relatives in (Russia)

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such as (Valeriy Tereshchenko). One of (Tereshchenko's) contacts is believed to be a target for contact by (KGB) and another is the son-in-law of the woman in whose apartment (Viktor Kravchenko) had been visiting. (Kravchenko) is a (Soviet) defector who recently committed suicide. The informant has advised of the activities and contacts of (Vladislaw Krasnow, Soviet) defector to Sweden in 1962. The Bureau was not aware previously that (Krasnow) was in the U.S.

*Although much material regarding communists and the Communist Party (CP) is also received from other sources, the informant continues to furnish additional details and new information regarding changes of employment and residence, travel, contacts and activities. Data regarding attempts of the DuBois Clubs to expand nationally and internationally was furnished in items on (Paula Garb) International Secretary, who went to the USSR) to marry a Soviet) if he can obtain a divorce. Items pertaining to (Mary Lou Camacho) (daughter of CP leader) told of the birth of her daughter, recenciliation with her (Cuban) husband, plans to go to Cuba to live and that one of her friends, a Security Index subject, was in Ghana when she was believed to be in the U.S.

Data is received regarding travel and contacts of (Mary Rakoczy) (widow of suspected espionage agent), who attended the Higher Party School of the Ukraine in Kiev, USSR) Information continues to be received regarding her son, (Andrew Rakoczy) who was allegedly studying ballet but actually attended the above school for almost two years. This has included his contacts. change of employment and residence and racial, poverty and Progressive Labor Party activities in Chicago. One of his contacts now at this school has been identified as (Teddie Kardash) son of Canadian communists. The source has also advised that (Irene Rakoczy) and three unidentified individuals plan to study dancing in (Kiev) this summer (possibly at the above-mentioned school which maintains a special section to combine lessons in dancing and indoctrination) and that (Bernard Francis Taylor) (son of CP) official), who went to the (USSR) with a musical and dancing group, remained in (Xiev) to attend school. (Don Zurilko), son of the alien wife of a U.S. citizen residing in State of Washington, is attending school in (Kiev). He is believed to be from the U.S. or Canada.

Additional information is received regarding persons involved in the peace movements, anti-Vietnam demonstrations, women's organizations, "teach-ins" (one has been in contact with a (GRU) officer), racial matters, Progressive Labor Party, Students for a Democratic Society, DuBois Clubs, Students Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and other organizations. Items reveal names of U.S. contacts with members of such (Soviet) propaganda organizations as the (Soviet Peace Committee, Soviet Women's Committee, Committee For Return to the Homeland) and others.

Data received regarding the following current and former double agents and sources has been utilized to evaluate their reliability: (Luke Chia Liu Yuan; Pedro Celestino Jimenez Moreno! Gordon Philip Polley; Hugo Rodriguez-Ramirez; Julius (5) Shell; NH 445-5; Phyllis Oja; Samuel Jaffe; NY 2911-5; NY 3556-5; CG 6562-5; Mr. and Mrs. George R. Atkins; and Boris I. Oblesow. (5) The field has been advised of individuals in close contact with Soviets with the request to consider for development as sources.

Information regarding (Soviet) exchange students (eight are (KGB) agents) includes names of associates, activities, travel, types of material requested to obtain and individuals with whom they continue to maintain contact after they leave the U.S. Similar information is furnished regarding other (Soviets) in the U.S. as a result of the exchange program. Material is also furnished regarding U.S. citizens who travel to the (USSR) as part of the exchange.

Data regarding current and former U.S. exchange students *shows (Soviet) and U.S. contacts before and after return, remantic involvements, sympathies and difficulties encountered in (Russia) A former exchange student has been in contact with a suspected espionage agent regarding (Ralph Matlaw) (according to (Nosenko), the KGB) was to attempt recruitment of (Matlaw). The source has revealed former exchange student (Michael Cole's) travel plans and continued "contacts with (Soviets) (one is son of an espionage agent) and (Henry Huttenbach's) attempts to obtain a divorce in order to marry a (Soviet) girl. Similar information is furnished regarding U.S. citizens who are, or have been, in {Russia }but are not under the exchange program. These include (Sally Harris, Natasha Kent, Kathy Boudin Two of the four U.S. citizens who have and Alexander Nikolauk! applied for entrance to Soviet) universities have stated that they desire to become (Soviet) citizéns. Material has been received regarding three employees of USIA, two U.S. citizens employed by the UN, a Federal employee who intends to marry a (Soviet) girl, three individuals involved with (Soviet) women and two U.S. contacts of (Galina Smirnova (an Intourist guide) who has compromised Americans in the past).

Contacts of foreign exchange students and aliens in the U.S. from (Canada, Peru, Cuba, Ecuador, Dominican Republic, Brazil, Uruguay, Colombia, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Mexico, Chile, Haiti, Italy, France, Iraq and Africa) with their friends in the (USSR) who are studying at (Friendship) University or other schools show that

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they may be communists. Two foreign students and an exile from (Haiti) have been acting as intermediaries. Several have applied for admittance to Friendship) University and other schools in the (USSR) because of finances or ideology. A (Nicaraguan) Marxist in the U.S. is acting as an intermediary for an individual at (Friendship University by forwarding mail to (Bolivia) Data is furnished regarding foreign students who attended school in the USSR) and are now in the U.S. One of these appears to have been compromised before he left(Russia) and another brought his (Soviet) wife to the U.S.

Items are received regarding (Soviets) who have entered the U.S. as wives of Americans: (Victoria Sandor (now a Federal employee); Ala Anderson; Ludmila Olsen) who has advised that she was approached by (Soviet) Intelligence when in the (USSR) in 1965; (Irina Horwitz; Nataliya Konigsford; and Rosita Brayton) wife of an (Alaskan) politician and newspaperman, who has become involved with a (Russian) born U.S. Army Captain. The source advised of contacts, travel and study in the (USSR of Mrs. Kemp Telley, Soviet) wife of former U.S. Naval Attache, who has admitted furnishing information regarding Americans to the (Soviets) in the 1940's.

Much material has been furnished regarding U.S. citizens! travel plans, including those of known subversives, their (Soviet) relatives and contacts and difficulties encountered by two tourists with (Soviet) authorities. Data has been received regarding (Soviets) and former U.S. citizens who have traveled, or intend to travel, *to the U.S., their contacts, activities and relatives. Several had renounced their U.S. citizenship and had been engaged in questionable activities in the past. (Mary Mackler), who recently returned to the U.S., has had numerous contacts with known subversives, at least two of whom were connected with espionage in the past. Material is received on U.S. defectors now in the (USSR)

Additional information received includes: plans of seven individuals to repatriate to the (USSR), U.S. contacts with current and former known and suspected (Soviet) agents now in the /USSR (Vladimir Sossinskiy, Vladimir Požner, Eugenia Olkhina, Leonids Rimjans, Vladimir Paramonov, Igor Melekh) and others): activities and contacts of current and former known and suspected espionage agents now in the U.S. (Aaron Pressman, Josef Zarovich, Victor Perlo, Helen Pozner Wilga) and others); the death of (Georgi Lieb) (suspected of working, as black market currency operator for KGB) and continuation of his contacts by his wife; activities of Kir'ill Alexeev) (suspect in (Umbel) case) family; (Soviet) contacts of Gerard Piel, who has been in contact, with a (KGB) officer;, (Soviet) contacts and travel of (D.
