## Dear Harry:

By a soriee of odd coincidences, I have beon moving about on the fringes of events connected to the tragedy of Dallas. Inst wook the Comtission appointed by Prosident Kerceracige Johnson to investigate the death of President Kennedy held its first two meetings in the National Archives and I sorved as the Comission's Press Officor on these two occasions. We had boen asked to provide a meoting place for the organizational meetings of the Comission and offered Chief Justice Warren a quiet conference room in tho National Archives. Apparently the Chief Justice wonts to koop unrelated the functions of the Suprome Court and the Commission; this dosire, again apparentiy, extends to physical facilition and persomnel. No press aide came over to the Archivos from the Suprome Court. By agreemont of the Chiof Justice and the Archivist of the United States, therefore, I was designated to attempt to bring a littie order from the press chaos that ocours in Washington at the scene of any significant news event.

Wy function has boen to act as a sort of "press policeman" rather than spokesmen. The Chief Justice himself ha s sorved as the Comission spokesman.

Last Thursia $y$ the first meeting was hold and there was a horde of reporters and photographers on hand to provide a crowd scene in the "quiet" Archives. Working with the Archivist and other officiale, we arranged reasonable security with uniformod and plain olothes security mon. Taking a lead from Dellas, we required all pross people to present oredentials. The section of the Arohives where tho conference room is situated was placed off limits to other porsons. The Chiof Justice suggested that I bring in the photographere at the start of the session so thoy could got thoir pioturos and then get the hell out; ho said to tell the roporters that there would be no statoment because the Comaisaion work was juat barely eetting under way. Ho allowed me to divide the photographers into two groups - stills and TV - becaus e thore was so many of thom. An amusing thing happoned: I took in the "stills" to shoot to minutes, then aslo $\alpha$ them to git out and lot the TV men como in with thioir handheld movie careras. One of the "stills" sneaked back in with the TV mon but ho was imnediately informed upon by his colleaguos who benged on the door and pushod thoir wry part way in, calling to me "He's cheating! He's a hog!." So the get the bums rush. Although the Chie? Justice said there would be no statement, some 40 reporters and seven TV orews romaine

In tho hal. - tho IV men with their bicg sound-on-iilm oamoras sot up. At the end of the three-hour session, however, the Chiof Justice did havo a fow minor coments to make and lot mo bring in the reporters to heor them, but without camoras and mikes. He cooperates with the press, but doesn't got pushod around. John MoCloy, one of the Commision mombora, just aat thore and elowored. The gecond day was a ro-run of the eifrat. Hopefully, the Comisaion will got a stapl this coming week and tho mochonics of the secsions will operate moro moothly.

The Chiof Justioe doen't care for scourity meanures at 011 - In fact, I gathor that ho distaing them. Thore is no formal protoction for hin in his pooition. Knoring the fury that his name evokos in some quarters, I find the leck of security a worriesone thing. His car dian't come for him for gone roason at the and of the second meeting and ho stood at the curb with Smator John Sherman Cooper for about 10 minutes. The Arohivist and I drove out of the basoment at that time, found thom standing there and gave them a lift up to the Hill. Wr. Warren has beon vory gracious to us, most appreciative for the fow thinge that we have been able to do for him andthe Commisaion.

This slight involvoment with the start of the Commisaion's meetings, coupled to the miseion to Port Worth, has me feeling that I hnve beon looking in on history. They are experioncos which I would have gladly foregone.

All of us are well hore. Give our love to Larehmont and New Rochelle.

Picture No. 2 shows you standing on the edge of the curb, Marjorie, my wife, has moved over by the door and I have got the dark glasses on and Jackie is walking to the car.

Picture No. 3 shows you greeting President Johnson on the curb. John Kennedy is in the car and Ralph Yarborough is to the rear of the second car and Cliff Carter is opening the door of the white car in the center of the street. That is Lady Bird Johnson with the white coat on and to the left of the man who is holding the coat is Mr. Johnson. Picture No. 4 shows Mr. Johnson with his coat on talking to you, but you are blocked out of the picture.

The above four pictures were taken when the Kennedys and the rest of the group were going to the airport to catch the plane to go to Dallas. The fifth picture was taken when Mr. Kennedy was going out to address the group on the parking lot before the breakfast. As you can see, this picture shows Senator Yarborough, Jim Wright, John Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson, Governor Connally, Marjorie, Raymond Buck and State Senator Don Kennard.

They have obtained the ballroom and have done little else so far.

Tickets: the Grand Bellroom at the Texas Hotel can seat a total of 2,000 persons INCLUDING non-eating working press.
No tickets or invitations have been sent out yet.
Buck tells me that he has received requests for tickets from: Gov. 200-300; Sen. none yet; Cong. Wright 300-400; Labor indeterminate amount; Democratic county chaiman indet. amount logal fed. of cls 50, county ofcls 50, city ofcls 25 . State Sen. Don Kennard $\qquad$ .
Letter to go out turvy to members of C of $C$ inviting them to apply for tix. (There are 3000 members. "e expects at least 1000 tix will be requested -- 500 plus 500 wives.)

Buck says that breakfast was set up on the idea that it is non-political, non-partisan. Tickets are free. Man and wife affair. Buck and several others to defray expenses.

Buck is former Democratic State Chairman. Weal thy lawyer. Good friend of Iyndon Johnson. Has been very cooperative.
On the tickets: he will include a clause in letter which says that tickets are limited and "first come, first served."
Here is tenative program:
8 A.M. -- Breakfast guests gather and meal served.
8:30 A.M. - Head table suests (exclusive of president and anyone he wants) seated and served. $\bar{y}$
8:45 A.M. -- President and Mre. Kennedy enter and are imnediately served. Combo from TCU plays "Hail to the Chief."

-- Texas Boys Choir entertains with two or three numbers

other guests at the head table, including wives. 9:10 A.M. -- President speaks for about 20 minutes. 9:45 A.M. -- President Leaves breakfast for room, after the usual shaking of hands etc.

Rest of schedule as previonsly outlined.

However, there is a strong feeling here that there should be a public exposure of the president in addition to the Chamber of Commerce luncheon. Although Mr. Buck has promised liberality in dispensing tickets, labor and working Democratic politicians feel that not enough attention is being paid to the pe ople who worked for and voted for the President.

We attended a meeting last night ar anged by the Govemor's men: attomey David O. Belew, Jr. In addition to Mrs. Belew, county Democratic cyikizutyothose people were in attendance:

Bill Potts, Tennant Democratic County Chairman;
Garrett Morris, state comaitteeman and campaign mager for Gov. Connally in last campaign;
Garland Ham, United Auto Workers Union ropresentative; John Heath, representative of International Association of Kachinists (at Gen'l Dynamics)
Bill Haworth, public relations representative from
This group pleaded for public exposure of the President. The plea was that the President take the time for a short address to the FT. Worth general citizenry either:

1. At the parking lot across the street from the Texas Hotel where the breakfast is being held;
2. At Burmett Park, Sour blocks away, where the President as a candidate spoke in 1960 ;
3. Or at Carswell Air Force Base where he will entilane for Dallas late in the moming of Now. 22.

A fourth suggestion was that thero be an extensive cavalcade up and down PT. Worth main stroets.

I have checked out these possibilities with Vr. Buck and ho has no objection as long as anything dobe does not interfere with the "non-partisanship" of the C of C breakfast.

Integration: the breakfast will be integrated, Mr. Buck tells me, because perhaps 30 persons from labor will be negro. (Incidentally, Yancey, APL-CIO chief, is out of town vigil Friday probably attending union conclave in NY.)

There were thouaands of persons on the base and ining the route to the Paxas Hotel Texas in downtown Ft. Worth. The party had been met at the base by a reception com-ittee consisting of the base commanding general and his wife, the President of the Chamber of Commerce and his kife, six officials of the Tarmant County OIO-AFL, the chaiman of County Democrats and his wife, the gxatu Democratic county com-1tteeworan and committeeman and their spouses, vice presidents of the $C$ of $C$ and their wives, the Kayor and his wife and the head county Administrative officer and his wife. There was another large crowd at the hotel when the presidential party arrived.

The breakfast started at 8 A.K. In the morning, sponsored by the Ft. Worth Chamber of Commerce. It was held in the Grand Ballroom with more than 2,000 in attendance. Or the 2000 tickets we had bren able during the advance period to obtain for varioue groups about 550, including:

The PresiAont ontored the breakfast fubxakont about 9 A.k. zxa after spaaking for sevaral minutes in the parking lot acrosc the street which was thronged with about 8000 people. He spoke in the ballroom, t where he was joined by his wife, for about 20 minutes. The speech was televised. When ho left the hotel after the address the parking lot was again thronged. The party proceedod back to the airport to the plaudits of large crowds Inning the route and at the alrport. The plane took off about 12 N for the flight to Dallas.

It was under John F. Kennedy in his 1900 campaign for The Presidency that greal orre was given to making decalled preparations Tur campaign appearances. Ven designated as "advance men" vere sent days in advance of the dave or the appearance to the specipic locality to make certain that it would yield the greatest return to the candidatex. This technique was again employed at the end or 1903 as a prelude to what was to be his campaign for reelection.

I was one of the Preaddential advance men in Texas on November 22, 1953 -- the day President Kennedy was assassinated. A week before Veterans Day, November 11, I vas told that I was to bo the advance man for the President'g visit to Fort Worth on November 22. The Preaiaent's Toxas trip was to inctuce speakitig bingage metits in 3 an Anton 10 and Houston November 21, an overnigut B way in Fori wow November $\frac{\mathrm{k}}{\mathrm{t}}$ am an adarese there at a cnamber or comiutce breakiast tat nexi tuoming. Tnat ary ne was also to speak at a lunoneon in Dallas anu at a
was in Ft. Worth. He was assassinated on the motor cavalcade route from Love Field in Dallas to the place where he was to speak.

Jerry Bruno in the Democratic National Committee had requested Bernard L. Boutin, Administrator of General Services, for assistance in helping make the final arrangements on the Texas trip and the assignment was given to me. In talking over the trip with Bruno, he decided to let me handle Ft. Worth. Several other agencies, similarly, * provided advance men for the other cities on the tour.

We left Andrews Air Force Base the morning of November 12 in a twin-engined aircraft which also was carrying the Secret Service Teams and communications specialists who had been assigned to the various points. It was a tedious flight in, by modern standards, a slow aircraft. I remember being amused by the sight of one Secret Service agent buried across the alsletanter In an Ian Flaming James Bond thriller. Ft. Worth was the next to last stop so we did not reach there until after 6 P.M. Texas time. We (those assigner to Ft. Worth) were driven to the Hotel Texas in an Air Force car after landing at Carsvell Air Force Base. Bill Duncan, was the Secret Service agent in charge assisted by fit Hall and by the Secret Service man-on-the-scene, Nike Howard. Major Jack Ruble of the Signal Corps attached to the White House was with us in charge of communications and assisted by a young lieutenant, Bill aomintrig or other, ) fartuedt
who was being trained for such work. Our first chore that night was to have excellent steaks in the Cattleman's restaurant.

The effort to shape up the President's visit to Ft. Worth began the next day. It had been determined previousiy that the Ft. Worth stop would be a non-partisan engagement, breakfast sponsored by the Ft. Worth Chamber of Commerce which, I believe, is rather heavily on the Republican side. However, the President of the Chamber, Raymond Buck, a vealthy lawyer and head of insurance coapanies, is a Democrat and close friend of the then-Vice President Johnson and Governor Connally. The Secret Service team and I visited with him on the morning of Nov. 13. He is obviously a man
 a free breakfast with him and several other Democrats picking up the entire tab. Mr. Buck described himself to me as the last of the long-haired Texas politicians after the death of Tom Connally. His white halr, in truth, curled around the back of his neck. In the succeeding days I zampxtnx gained a great deal of respect for him as a man of integrity and as a doer of things without exciting antagonisms, or rather, I should day, with keeping antagonisms to a minimum. For when I arrived I found that the basic format of the Ft. Worth visit was causing trouble. The Democratic party workers resented the fact that the sponsoring organization of the President's visit was the Repubilcan oriented Chamber of Commerce. Labor also was unhappy with this arrangement
and, as it later turned out, so were the Negro and Spanish-American communities.

To complicate matters further politically, the liberal Senator Ralph Yar orough of Texas was engaged in a feud with Governor John Connally. Furthermore, there was a marked coolness between Yarborough and Vice President Johnson. I was told that Yarborough had refused to allow ixna Connally and Johnson to be invited to a testimonial dinner in his behalf. Connally, I soon became aware from hls people, had refused to invite Yarborough to his reception for the President in Austin. As soon as $I$ was in residence in the Hotel Texas, I began to receive telephone calls from Connally people passing along the word that the Governor did not want Yarborough seated at the head table at the Ft. Worth breakfast and did not want Yarborough seated in one of the front cars in the motorcade. I was, hovever, under instruc 1ons from Bruno to make sure that Yarborough was not slighted. He had been one of the most rellable supporters of the Presicent's program in the Senate.

The days that followed were filled with discuscions Individually or severally, with Kr . Buck, Executive Vice Presicent of the Chamber of Commerce Milton Atkinson who obviously vas a conservative Republican, Tarrant County Democratic Chaiman B1ll Potte, State Committeevoman (Democratic) Marjorie Belew and her husband Dave, State Combitteeman Garrett Vorr1s who had been Connally's campaign chaimman, O.C. Yancey Jr. who headed the AFL-CIO Central

Dabor Council and his associates, Negro leader Dr. Narion J. Brooks and, the day before the breakfast, Xata Jake Cardenas of the Spanish-American group known as SANO. And many others. W1th the cooperation of Nr. Buck, 550 of the 2000 available tickets for the brealcfast were made avallable free to Democrats, the Labor Unions, Negroes and Soamich-Americans. I required each group do complie lists and chnnnel them through me. Mr. Buck and his friends, who he did not identify, were to mxaxxuy pay for these tickets. The rest of the tickets were sold to members of the Chamber of Commerce at $\$ 3$ sach.

Congressman J1m Wright of Fort Worth ohecked into the hotel for two days a couple of rooms down the hall from mine. Itold him biuntly that the intra-party squabuling between Yarborough and Connally was noneense. He agreed and, I belleve, did his best to mxxazarxtherx contain the dispute insofar as it affected Ft. Worth. Bill Moyers, young Deputy Director of the Peace Corps and close friend of Vice President Johnson, had arrived in Austin in the meantime to coordinate the entire Texas visit and we were in touch two or three times a day by telephone. There were three telephones in my hotel room toward the end and one, at least, was usually ringing. One of the phones was tied in to a su1tchboard connecting alrectly w1th the White House. The press got on to me finally, thanks to someone in the labor union leadership, and reporters began ringing me. Rather than deal in equivocations, I told them factually that I was deputy assistant administrator of the General Services

Administration and had been de+alled by the White House to coominate the Pt. Worth visit. Koyers saw one of the stories in one of the Ft. Worth dallies and called me to say he was going to recommend when we returned to Washington that other advance men during the eampaign be as frank if tracked down by the press rather than try and maintain the fiction that they were where they were on agency business.

Neantime, Duncan and his ascociates were busy from morning until might holding meetings with enforcement agencies to insure the security of the President. I attended xasrex their meating with Major General, or was it Brigadior, Noore at Carswell A1r Force Base and the officers he had assigned to work on the visit. We succeeded in getting Moore to open the base to the public both on the night of the President's arrival and on the moming of $h 1 s$ planned departure. Carswell ie a SAC base and security there usually p-ecludes opening the base to the public. Difrerent routes to and from the bata base were decided upon and diagrammed in the newspapers so that the public would know where to stand to see the Presidential party. Arter much pushing*and pulling, I set up the welcoming-farewell committee composed of Chamber of Commerce off1cials, city and county pubilc officials, labor union leaders and Democratic local officials.

In the off-hours I consumed a substantial quantity of Scotch. Ross Wilder, our GSA Director of Business Affalrs in Dallas, met me in Ft. Worth and introduced me to the owner of the Empire Club Just down the street from the hotel where

I was $s$ igned on as an honorary member and could buy mixed drinks and steaks. In Texas you have to belong to a club in other to buy hard 11 quor by the drink. I gave membersh1p cards to the Secret Service guys and used to meet them in mid-evening at the Club for discussions about the day's business. They were abstemious -- a couple of drinks and that was 1t. On several nights we dropped down to an after-hours place two blocks from the hotel called "The Cellaril -- a joint protected by the local police where the beatniks abounded and horrid drinks such as coffee royals or bourbon, or what passed as bourban, was served with ?-Up. We nenver stayed more than half an hour because the din from drums and guitars was more than the ordinary ear could bear. The plans for the visit gradually fell together. The diverse groups were more or less satisfied with the numbers of tickets aselgned them. The Connally people gave in and arrangements were made to give Senator Yarborough everything to which he was entitled by protocol -- including a seat at the head table and a seat in the car with the Vice President in the motorcade.

Wilder came over to Dallas and checked into the hotel on November 21 to assist me. The Presidential party was to arrive at Carswell around 11 P.M. and W1lder and I drove out there and I lined up the welcoming committee in a hangar. Air Force Number 1 armived and landed and the President and
his party aisembarked to the cheers of thousands. Majorie Below hande: Mrs. Xennedy a rather heavily dewed armful $102 /$ red roses. The motorcade took off for town and, despite the hour, the sidewalks were ilned with cheering people.

Wilder and I went back to the hotel in his car and, after the Presidential party was settled, I went up to the President's floor and reported to Kenny O'Donnell on the advance arrangements. He was standing in a room laughing at the antics atyss of Dave Powers, the President's companion, who in his shorts was tumbling around on a bed. O'Donnell was pleasant enough but wanted to know why the Congressmen accompanying the President had to wait at the desk in the lobby rather than being escorted right to their rooms. This was a detall that hadn't occurred to me.

I went up to W1lder's room and his Empire Club ownerfriend came over with his wife and we talked and had a few drinks and then broke up for the night.

One of the big points of the Democratic party workers was that the Presldent would not get enough exposure at the breakfast the next morning, so the White House was prevalled upon to have him walk across the street to a paricing lot where a platform had been erected. He spoke briefly and pleasantly to the crowd, menioning that $\mathrm{Mrs}. \mathrm{~K}_{\text {. }}$ Kennedy was not"organized"yet. "It takes longer of course," he sa1a, "but, of course, she looks better than we do when she does 1t." He spoke of the defense strength of our country and of Texas's contribution to $1 t$. It was drizzling. Policemen in
raincoats stood on the roofs of the buildings overlooking the parking 20 .

The President went back inside the hotel and went to the Grand Ballroom where the guests had nearly finlshed their breakfists. His entrance, as arwanged by the secret Service, was through the kitchen so he could go directly to the head table. I stood with the Secret Service in the kitchen doorway. Soon Vrs. Kennedy was standing behind us dressed in a dusky pink suit and looking charming. She had to stay there for a while as Kr . Buck finished the introductions of head table guests. There were wild cheers as she walked down the aisle. Mr. Buck presented the President with a pair of boots and a Stetson -- he had asked me beforehand if this would be appropriate and I told him "sure." Mr. Aennedy didn't put on the hat. He started his remarks with a witticism about the mnuy getting up and getting down that had been going on during introductions:
"I know now why everyone in Texas, Ft. Worth, is so thin, having gotten up and down about nine times. This is what you do every morning..."

The President's remarks were directed to the country's defense posture, liberally sprinkled with references to what $F t$. Worth had contributed to $1 t$ including helicopters, the new TEX planes and the World War II bombers. He charmed the audience. The enthusiasm was almost tangible in the room.

When he finished the ovation was loud and long. He came down the alsle to the kitchen with his wife. 级 H1s xax face looked young and was wreathed with smiles. Hands stretched over the ropes and he grasped many.

About that time Congressman Albert Thomas, GSA's Appropriation chairman, spotted me and came over and shook my hand and said "Congratulations on what you fellows did here." He also handed me his hatcheck and a quarter for the hatcheck room and asked me if I would get his hat since it was across the ballroom. I got it and met him out in front of the hotel where the cars were lined up for the motorcade. Larry O'Brien was there and placed Senator Yarborough in a car with Mrs. Johnson. Then O'Brien stepped back and suggested that I usher Johnson into that car when he appeared. I did after perhaps a querulous look from the Vice President. President and Mrs. Kennedy came out to multitudinous cheers and climbed into their car-and the motorcade moved.off. Wilder and I went out to the alroort in his car. The departure committee did 1 ts duty and the Presidential plane took off. Nost of the people in the departure committee, their faces aglow, came over and shook my hand. There were thousands of people standing cheering behind the barricades as the b1g 707 jet -- blue and white -- roared into action and took off. Headed for Dallas. It must have been about 11 A.M.

We went back to the Hotel Texas and I made reservations
for a commer ial illght by jet to Friendship Alrport in Baltimore. Jerry Bruno called from Washington and Koyers from Austin to ack how things had gone in Ft. Worth. I lay down on the bed for a short nap. There was sudaenly a loud knocking on the door. It was Ross Wilder. "Your boss is dead," he said through the door. "Murn on the radio." I let $h 1 m$ in an turned on the radio. Beautiful." Then we walked across Kemorial Bridge in the gathering dusk toward our car which we had parked at a fringe parking lot on the Virginia side. Fite entire family had vibited the grave on Thanksdiving Day.

In the intervening tima between the President's death and the end of official mourning, I had served unofficially as press officer for the first three meetings of the Presidential Commission headed by Chief Justice "arren to investigate the assassination. It fell to my lot because the flrst three meetings were held in the National Archives which is a part of GSA. After the third meeting the Commission had a staff and new headquarters on the fourth floor of the VFW building behind the Supreme Court so my services were no longer needed.
