

# RACIAL CONDITIONS, NESHOBA COUNTY

On 4/2/68 the confidential source advised that local Negroes at Philadelphia, Mississippi at a recent meeting of the NAACP local chapter voiced the opinion that the sale of illegal whiskey and beer in Neshoba County was corrupting the morals of the Negroes in Neshoba County. Source stated that it was the opinion of those present, headed by CLINT COLLIER, that the recent referendum on the liquor question failed in Neshoba County because the power structor wished to continue illegal sales, especially to Negroes to better control the Negroes within the community. The group felt that they could keep the Negroes apart by continuing sales to them. Plans were discussed to get together with Sheriff E. G. BARNETT, Neshoba County, to make their wishes known to him and for the NAACP to circulate petitions to "end the situation".

The source further advised that he personally felt that there was no potential possibility of any "flair ups" in the Philadelphia, Miss. area. He states jobs are available for those that want to work and progress has been steadily maintained in the area. Based on this personal observation, the source was unable to foresee any immediate racial problems.

#### MISCELLANEOUS:

On 4/10/68, source advised that he would be alert for the presence of SAM BOWERS, Imperial Wizard, WKKKKOM in the Philadelphia, Miss. area. He stated he is familiar with BOWERS and would alert the Negro community to inform him if BOWERS is ever seen in the Neshoba County area of Mississippi.

Source was also apprised of information regarding the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING and alerted to determine if anyone in the area might know JOHN WILLARD, HARVEY LOWMEYER, HARVEY LOWMYER or ERIC STARVO GALT as residents of Neshoba County, Miss. In addition, the source was furnished with physical descriptions of individuals and asked to furnish any names of Neshoba Countians who might fit these descriptions. Source advised that he would immediately notify the FBI should he hear any information.

On April 18, 1968 and April 19, 1968 the source was contacted and advised that based on inquiries initiated by him he had no information regarding the prepetrator of the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING. He stated the local Negroes did not participate in marches or parades in memory of MARTIN LUTHER KING, however, the school officials in Neshoba County had given the Negro students the day off on the date of the KING burial. Initially the source advised that Negro leaders in the Independence Quarter Section of Philadelphia, Miss. had clamored for a dismissal of classes for an entire week. However, the group relented and settled for one day off.

Source also advised that he had heard of no contact with outside Negroes, especially students, regarding any plans for disorder or violence anticipated in Raleigh, North Carolina on April 20, 1968.

# PLANNED MEMORIAL MARCH, JUNE 21, 1968

The source advised on May 2, 1968 that Negroes in the Quarter Section of Philadelphia, Miss. are meeting and talking about formulating plans to observe the anniversary date of the slaying of the three civil rights workers in Neshoba County on June 21, 1968. The source states that they plan to invite people from out of the State of Mississippi to attend these memorial services. At this point the source related that the group would attempt to organize a motorcade from within the Quarter

Section to drive to the Mt. Zion Church located outside Philadelphia, Miss. and conduct memorial services at the church. Source added that no other plans have been finalized and would advise the FBI in the event any new plans occur.

RALPH FEATHERSTONE, SNCC REPRESENTATIVE ATLANTA, GEORGIA

Source also advised that RALPH FEATHERSTONE. SNCC Field Director from Atlanta, Ga. has been to the Philadelphia area during the past weekend (April27-28, 1968). He states FEATHERSTONE met with several Negroes in the area and talked about Negro voter registration efforts, education and politics. He stated that in regards to politics FEATHERSTONE attempted to instruct Negro citizens as to who they should support and who they should not support. In addition, source related t hat general discussions took place in the civil rights field and the current efforts on the part of the Negro community throughout the country in seeking to rectify racial injustices. The source also stated that FEATHERSTONE, who had previously visited Philadelphia, Miss. in June, July of 1966, did not "rabble rouse", but talked about passed racial injustices and how the Negroes, by working to gether, might better their lot. Source advised that he would keep the FBI alerted as to the activities of FEATHERSTONE within the Quarter Section of Philadelphia, Miss.

Mrs. LEWIS went on to say that about six years ago and she believed it to be 1961, a Negro male was murdered at Poplarville, Miss., and thrown into a small river near there. The river separates Mississippi and Louisiana at that point and is near Bogalusa, La. She believes there were six white males who went to a jail at Poplarville, beat and abducted the Negro prisoner from his cell. The Negro had been accused of raping a white woman in the State of Mississippi. She further advised that none of the six whites were ever arrested and she does not know if any of the six were Klansmen. She said that she knows/the identity of two of the bows who were involved at the time. One was a white male by the name of TERRY HERRING, age 23, of Bogalusa, La. She declined to name the other male at that time since he is a fried of one of her daughters who is presently visiting in Bogalusa, La. She said that she would disclose this name after her daughter's return to Gastonia, N. C.

She further advised that HERRING has had psychiatric treatment as a result of being bothered by the murder in which he participated. He admitted taking part in this murder and named the other boy whomshe knew, but declined to identify at this time. She said that she learned from a very reliable source that HERRING had participated in this murder and HERRING admitted the murder to this source. She further advised that she never heard that any of these individuals were arrested for the murder or tried for same.

At approximately 8:11 p.m., on 5/7/68, Sheriff BILL HARPOLE, Oktibbeha County SO, Starkville, Miss., telephonically contacted me at my home to advise that he had some people in his office who had what he believed to be information relative to the above captioned matter and requested that I come to the SO at Starkville, Miss., to interview these individuals.

I traveled to Starkville, Miss., arriving there at approximately 9:00 p.m., on 5/7/68, and thereafter interviewed the following individuals obtaining from them the information that they possessed.

Mrs. JEANNE BRITT EVANS, who is also known as JEANNE BRITT, Mrs. JAMES R. BRITT, Mrs. CONNIE LAKE EVANS, nee JEANNE LANGLEY, a white female, age 34, date of birth place of birth Tupelo, Miss., who currently resides at 105 Umberson Road, Houston, Miss., and whose telephone number is 456-2772, was accompanied by her brother GAYLE LANGLEY, 511 Scale Street, Starkville, Miss. Mrs. EVANS related that she had come upon information which she believed might be valuable in the solution of MURKIN. She said that she was furnishing this information and if it resulted in any solution to the case, she would expect to receive the reward which was outstanding. It was explained to Mrs. EVANS that the FBI did not offer a reward, that the reward has been offered by other authorities but that should the information she furnish be responsible for the arrest and conviction of the subject of this matter then her volunteering this information in the presence of Sheriff HARPOLE would be made known to the authorities offering the reward in question.

Mrs. EVANS explained that she had been a widow with five children in Houston, Miss., and that her former husband was JAMES R. BRITT. During 1967, she had met and married an art teacher at the Houston High School in Houston, Miss., by the name of CONNIE LAKE EVANS. She had married EVANS on 2/8/67, at Tupelo, Miss. He reported to her that he was 49 in 1967, however, she subsequently learned that his date of birth was and that his place of birth was Tupelo, Miss. She became separated from EVANS in May of 1967, and in August of 1967, he "ran off" with a married woman by the name of MARY LOU CROMEANS of Fulton, Miss., who was, as she said, married and had two children.

She explaimed that she has not seen her former husband CONNIE LAKE EVANS since May of 1967. She learned from Reverend STOVALL of Fulton, Miss., who she said was a brother to MARY LOU CROMEANS, that EVANS had run off with MARY LOU CROMEANS and was actually living in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She said during November, 1967, MARY LOU CROMEANS returned to her family in Fulton, Miss., and subsequently called at her house to tell her that she had been the person who ran off with her husband. She said that CROMEANS told her at that time that EVANS had returned to Mississippi during the third week in November of 1967, and was currently staying at his sister's home, BETTY (LNU), who reportedly lives, in Plantersville, Miss.

She further advised that she had received two additional telephone calls from MARY LOU CROMEANS during the intervening time that she was to see her next and that there was no indication during the telephone conversations that she, MARY LOU CROMEANS, had contacted EVANS.

On May 6, 1968, she received a telephone call at approximately 5:30 p.m., from MARY LOU CROMEANS. She at this

time told her that she had some valuable information and wanted to talk to her personally. Mrs. CROMEANS was invited to Mrs. EVANS' home.

At 10:00 a.m., on May 7, 1968, MARY LOU CROMEANS came to her residence. She said that she had learned where EVANS was living and said that he was staying in mean Tupelo, Miss., on the Saltillo Road at the residence of W. C. E. JOHNSON.

She said that she had gone to W. C. E. JOHNSON's house to get a painting that belonged to her that EVANS had in his possession. She said that when she first came to the door, EVANS answered the door and she noted that he had an inch beard on his face. He was glad to see her and acted if he believed that she was coming back to resume their "affair". She explained to him that this was not her purpose increturning to his dwelling but that her purpose was to get the painting which he had in his possession that belonged to her. He told her at that time that he had plenty of money, that his brother in Memphis, Tennessee, had died and left him \$40,000. She told him that she knew that this was untrue, that his brother in Memphis had died but that she had read the cobituary in the newspaper and that he was not even listed as a surviving relative. He said 'Oh you read that in the paper, huh?", 'well I still have plenty of money" whereupon he opened his billfold and showed her numerous \$1,000 bills. She said that she was not interested in living with him anymore but she did want her painting. He said that he would get it for her in the near future and she thereafter got in the car and left. She also advised Mrs. WVANS that prior to her departure, he, EVANS, had introduced her to W. C. E. JOHNSON, whose house he was living in, and that JOHNSON was a man of about EVANS' age, and looked as if he had been heavily doped.

She saw also at this time that EVANS' automobile which was a white Valiant was parked at the rear of the house

and did not have a license on it.

On 5/6/68, she telephoned W. C. E. JOHNSON's house and an unknown individual answered the telephone. She asked for EVANS, the voice said, No Mr. EVANS is not here. then asked when he was expected to return and the voice said that Mr. EVANS had left and would not be back. She said who was speaking and the voice said Mr. STAVO. and then hung up the telephone. She said that she could not get involved in this matter as her husband did not want her to see EVANS again and she did not want to jeopardize her return to her husband and family by letting her husband know that she had actually contacted EVANS on this occasion. She said that she is suspicious that EVANS may be involved in the MARTIN LUTHER KING assassination. She said that the money EVANS had on him gave her this opinion, that the man answering the telephone gave his name as STAVO, and that EVANS had belonged to the International Businessmen's Association. which association according to Mrs. CROMEANS is reported to have put up the money to have KING killed.

She explained also to Mrs. EVANS that she understood that there was a \$100,000 reward and desired that she furnish this information to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

Mrs. EVANS further advised that it was her understanding that EVANS had once been employed on the Indian Reservation and has been placed in the Federal penitentiary for stealing Indian money. She did not know the Federal penitentiary in which he was incarcerated. She also advised that she does recall Mrs. CROMEANS telling her that she had noted on the time that she had ridden by the place on 5/7/68, that there was a green late model station wagon parked in the parking area of W. C. E. JOHNSON's home and that this station wagon did not have a license plate on it.

Mrs. EVANS said she was supplying this information for what it might be worth and she was thanked for her cooperation in furnishing the information.

On 5/7/68, at approximately 10:30 p.m., this information was telephonically furnished to SA JOHN CASTLES at Tupelo, Miss., and he was advised that a memo relative to the contact and information furnished by Mrs. EVANS would be dictated in this matter.

Agent CASTLES advised that he would see to it that Mrs. CROMEANS of Fulton, Miss., would be interviewed as she would appear to be the original source in the information in question. The conduct of the investigation would thereafter be based upon the interview with Mrs. CROMEANS.

JOHNSON's house and an unknown individual answered the telephone. for EVANS, the voice said, No Mr. EVANS is not here. then asked when he was expected to return and the voice said that Mr. EVANS had left and would not be back. She said who was speaking and the voice said Mr. STAVO, and then hung up the telephone. She said that she could not get involved in this matter as her husband did not want her to see EVANS again and she did not want to jeopardize her return to her husband and family by letting her husband know that she had actually contacted EVANS on this occasion. She said that she is suspicious that EVANS may be involved in the MARTIN LUTHER KING assassination. She said that the money EVANS had on him gave her this opinion, that the man answering the telephone gave his name as STAVO, and that EVANS had belonged to the International Businessmen's Association. which association according to Mrs. CROMEANS is reported to have put up the money to have KING killed.

Mrs. EVANS said she was supplying this information for what it might be worth and she was thanked for her cooperation in furnishing the information.

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Agent CASTLES advised that he would see to it that Mrs. CROMEANS of Fulton, Miss., would be interviewed as she would appear to be the original source in the information in question. The conduct of the investigation would thereafter be based upon the interview with Mrs. CROMEANS.

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


