

Return

Prosecutor Visits Man In Prison

Prosecuting Official
Talks With Suspect
In Dr. King Slaying

LONDON (AP) — Asst. U.S.
Atty. Gen. Fred M. Vinson Jr.
visited James Earl Ray in a
heavily guarded police station
Sunday, then began moving 'o
get the accused killer of Dr.
Martin Luther King Jr. back to
the United States as quickly as
possible. As he did, a new element of mystery in the case
arose.

Airport sources said that Ray, seized Saturday while trying to board a flight for Brussels, could have gone from the Lisbon plane that brought him to London directly to the transit lounge, and thus avoided immigration officers.

His capture indicated he left the transit lounge — either to meet someone or possibly to kill time — and consequently got caught.

Vinson talked with British authorities about Ray's extradition, a procedure which would take two to three weeks under normal conditions. But if Ray hired lawyers to challenge the action, the process could run considerably longer with an initial hearing and possible appeals

Ray, 40, was being kept under tight security at Cannon Row police station in preparation for his appearance Monday morning at Bow Street Magistrate's Court. He will answer there to two charges growing out of his arrest at Heathrow Airport — traveling under a false passport and illegal possession of a firearm.

In Memphis, Tenn., where King was killed, Phil M. Canale, Shelby County attorney general, said Ray would be returned to stand trial for first-degree murder with all "deliberate speed."

In Washington, U.S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark said Ray has made no statement and would not be questioned except in a manner "in strict conformity to applicable legal standards".

Clark said Vinson's top priori-

ties in his mission are to see that Ray is as secure as he can be—that nothing happens to him —and that he is returned to the United States for trial as soon as possible.

NO TIME ESTIMATE

Clark said he could make no estimate of how soon Ray might be returned. He said it is possible Ray might waive extradition or that he might be deported under an "exclusion principle" of British law. Clark did not elaborate.

He said he is working with Tennessee Gov. Buford Ellington, Vinson and British officials on the question of extradition if that proves necessary.

Asked about a possible con-

Asked about a possible conspiracy in the murder of King, particularly in view of the suspect's expensive travel without known financial means, Clark said:

"We have to go on the evidence and facts. At this time we have no evidence of a conspiracy. If there was one, it will be discovered."

Clark said Ray "is a person who lived a life of crime" and it was plausible that he might have financed his travels that

Clark was interviewed on the ABC radio-television program "Issues and Answers."

A yard spokesman said Ray was under constant surveillance. "This is a big fish," he told a caller.

"Ray, who disappeared for two months after King's assassination April 4, had a loaded pistol in his hip pocket when immigration officers seized him.

After arriving in London Sunday to "expedite the extradition," Vinson met at Scotland Yard headquarters with Chief Superintendent Thomas Butler, head of the flying squad that handled Britain's Great Train Robbery case, and Chief Inspector Kenneth Thomson. They were reported offering Vinson full cooperation in speeding the extradition process.

Talking with newsmen, Vinson declined to say if he would seek to return Ray on the federal charge of conspiring to deny King his civil rights or on a Tennessee charge that he murdered King.

Legal sources said that to extradite Ray, American authorities would have to submit an application at Bow Street Court for the prisoner's provisional arrest -to keep him in jail -under the British-American extradition treaty.

To support this, the court would require material evidence showing there was a case against Ray. The British court would weigh the evidence and grant leave for extradition if a magistrate agreed the evidence was material and justifiable. This, normally, would take two or three weeks.

Ray could contest the extradition application and possibly the evidence as well, provided he hired or obtained a lawyer. If a magistrate overruled that defense, Ray could appeal and the case would go to a higher court.

Under provisional arrest, Ray would have to appear before a magistrate once every seven days for police, under the habeas corpus principle, to show reason why he was still being held.

DEFINITELY RAY

The suspect was booked under the name of Ramon George Sneyd, the name which appeared on his false Canadian passport, but the Justice Department said he definitely was

An American Embassy official said Ray's extradition papers would include "all his known aliases," and that the name Sneyd would raise no problems in that respect.

The narrow street leading to Cannon Row police station, about 200 yards from the House of Parliament, was deserted Sunday, in marked contrast to the crowd which milled there after word of Ray's arrest was announced Saturday.

The iron gates leading to the station and the former head-quarters of Scotland Yard were open and guarded by a pair of tall London bobbies. They denied entrance to newsmen, saying: "The desk sergeant is not available."

Hundreds of tourists passed by the entrance to Cannon Row, but none was seen venturing down the narrow street. Police signs blocked the path of automobiles.

Ray was seized by immigration officials at Heathrow Airport after he stopped over at 6:10 a.m. Saturday on a British European Airways jet from Lisbon. He was headed for Brussels.

At the immigration barrier for transit passengers, officials asked Ray to enter their office "for further inquiries" on suspicion that his Canadian passport was false

Searching him they found the

loaded revolver.
Police made their formal arrest at 11:15 a.m. five hours after Ray's arrival. But they kept

a close security clamp on him and repeatedly denied that they were holding him even after the announcement of his arrest came from Washington.

Scotland Yard confirmed the arrest later but a police statement gave the arrested man's name only as Ramon George Sneyd.

Chief Inspector Butler said: "Although the man claims to be Sneyd, his physical description is in fact identical to that of James Earl Ray.'

Vinson told newsmen at London Airport earlier that people in America were "delighted" at Ray's arrest and that was greeted with "a great feeling of re-

"We have been looking for him for a long time," Vinson

Vinson was asked whether he would apply for a voluntary or a compulsory extradition order.

"The easiest way is always the best one," he replied. " He gave the impression he did

not anticipate any difficulty or much delay in bringing Ray back to the United States for

It was learned that Ray had flown from Canada to London May 6 with a round-trip ticket but cashed in the return portion in exchange for passage to Lisbon and went right on to Portugal getting off in the British

The FBI, with the help of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, had picked up Ray's trail in Canada -apparently after he left — and officers satisfied themselves a few days ago that the man bearing a passport in Sneyd's name was Ray

Dear Floyd:

I would like to take this means of extending our thanks to you and officials of your Drivers License Division, particularly Major Bankhead Bates and his associates, for the fine cooperation given to us in connection with the investigation of James Earl Ray, who is accused of the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King.

As you know, one Eric Starvo Galt, subsequently identified as Ray, an escapee from the Missouri State Penitentiary where he was serving 20 years for armed robbery, bought a car in Birmingham and then applied for and was granted a drivers license in Alabama. Prior to the identification of Galt as Ray, Major Bates furnished copies of the application and other documents which were sent to Washington for handwriting comparisons.

With the thought in mind that Ray might have conceived the idea of establishing a new identity for himself after the shooting, the Drivers License Division made available to us all the applications for April and May 1968. We screened these for possible suspects and were in the process of conducting further investigation when Ray was apprehended in England.

inferenced airtel suggested that the Mobile Office consider interviewing former Sheriff HARVEY SADLER for any information he might have concerning the assassination of KIMG. This lead was based upon a letter from Mrs. ALMENA LOWAX, Lower Poll and Tribune, Los Angeles, Calif., to SA LLOYD JOHNSON of the Los Angeles Office. In this letter, Mrs. LAWAX points out that former Sheriff HARVEY SADLER of Mason County, Ala., is a supporter of former devernor GEORGE WALLACE of Ala. She expressed the opinion that the KING assassination was plotted by the WALLACE forces "to provoke Megroes to riot to further WALLACE's political ambitions."

For the information of the Bureau and Los Angeles, former Sheriff HARVEY SADLER of Macon County, Tuskagee, Ala., during his term of office, was cooperative and forthright with the Mobile Office of the FBI. On more than one occasion, he was instrumental in averting violent confrontations between Negro marchers seeking to integrate white churches and opposing groups of white persons. At no time was he known to display a hostile attitude toward Negro citizens of that community.

On the other hand, Mrs. ALMENA LONAX, while residing in Tuskegee, Ala., acquired a reputation as a fanatic. /Fer Tuskegee Tribune made many irresponsible charges against leading citizens of the community, both Negro and white, particularly against those seeking to bring about racial harmony through bi-racial groups. Her paper supported the militant actions of Student Monviolent Coordinating Committee (SMCC), which then was gaining a foothold at Tuskegee Institute.

In the letter accompanying the referenced airtel, Mrs. LCMAX characterizes her expressions as "scuttlebutt." Upon review, her letter does not appear to make any accusation that ex-sheriff HARVEY SADLER was connected with the slaying of Dr. KING; rather it is speculated that the VALLAGE forces might be responsible for the slaying because they profitted therefrom. SADLER is associated with this alleged "plot" only in that he has been a WALLAGE supporter in the past.

There does not appear to be any more basis for interview of former Shariff SADLER than for interview of GEORGE WALLACE or other WALLACE supporters. UACB no interview of SADLER will be conducted.

Break In Slaying Case

The arrest of James Earl Ray, wanted in the slaying of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., had to compete with the funeral of Sen. Robert Kennedy in the headlines this past weekend but is was a welcome piece of newsfor most Americans.

This suspect in the Memphis slaying of the civil rights leader had been sought diligently by all law enforcement agencies since his linking with the event. The trail had led officers to Canada and his apprehension Saturday in London came a little over two months after the massive manhunt began.

Many had begun to suspect that Ray would never be captured alive—in fact, they thought he probably had been disposed of in order to keep investigators off the trail of anyone who might have been linked with him in the even it turned out to be the conspiracy that so many thought the slaying was:

It will only be a matter of time now until Ray (he was using an assumed name at the time of his arrest but U.S. officials stated there is no doubt as to his identity) is returned to the United States to face charges against him in the King slaying.

Meanwhile, the big effort will be to try to

track down the source of the big money Ray has been spending in travelling around this country as well as foreign countries. That information could turn out to be the biggest break in the case.

With the suspect in the case now in custody, complaints should subside about the FBI and other agencies and their efforts in the case. The detailed and methodical work of the FBI finally paid off, just as fair-minded persons knew it would. Only those with special axes to to grind could have found any reason to voice any concern about the intention and efforts of U.S. law officials to solve this case.

With Ray's arrest, the two persons accused of the slayings of two of the three assassinations which have rocked this nation in the past few years will have their day in courta a day in which was denied the third one since the accused slayer of President Kennedy was himself assassinated before judicial pro-cesses could be completed.

We hope that these days in court will not, be delayed too long. For Justice needs to be prompt as well as fair if it is to serve all of society.

The Bureau, by radiogram dated 5/22/68, instructed that all Offices covering State Capitols check at DLBs for all driver's license applications for the months of April and May,1968 concerning all male Caucasians over 30 years of age and under 55 years of age in view of the fact that it is possible that subject RAY secured a driver's license using another name other than his known aliases. As result of reviewing these applications, it was instructed that appropriate investigation then be made to determine if any such individuals are identical with subject.

In contact with the Bureau 5/23/68, it was determined that we should consider only those white males in the 30 to 55 age limit who weigh 150 to 200 pounds and are from 5'8" to 6'1".

SA B. TIM MC COY on 5/27 and 28/68, reviewed the driver's license application records at Montgomery for the month of April and the first two weeks of May; the other two weeks of May will be available at a later date for checking.

Falling within the guidelines above, there were 206 new licensees within the Mobile Div. territory and an IBM card for each such licensee was obtained, which card reflects his name, address and description. In the event it is necessary, the original application is available at Montgomery which reflects the person's signature and employment data.

There was a total of 289 such licensees within the Birmingham territory, and these cards have been furnished to 2

Birmingham for handling.

Big Fat Man' Is Added To Ray Mystery

TORONTO (AP) - A Toronto taxi driver says he picked up a "big fat man" May 2 across the street from one of the two rooming houses where James Earl Ray lived, the Toronto Star reported Wednesday.

The Star said Manuel Reis, 35. drove the man and a friend three blocks west to a bank where they got out.

Earlier this week, Mrs. Sun Loo, landlady at one of the houses where Ray lived, said a tall fat man came to her door and asked for Mr. Sneyd, one of the aliases used by Ray. She said the man gave Ray an envelope.

Ray, accused of slaying civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., was arrested in London Saturday. He arrived in Toronto April 8, four days after King was killed in Memphis, Tenn. Ray left Toronto by air May 6.

The newspaper said taxi cabs were called to 955 Dundas St. W. three times May 2. The address is directly across the street from No. 962 where Ray lived at the time.

Anthony Szczepura, a tenafit at No. 955, was quoted as saying no one in his family called cass that day.

The newspaper said Reis arrived at the Dundas Street location around noon and found two men waiting on the sidewalk in front of the house.

Reis also said he made a trip to pick up a fare at 932 Dundas St. W. on May 1 and the passenger looked like Ray. Reis found the fare standing on the sidewalk. No one at the address sail a taxi was ordered that day, the newspaper said.

The Star said Reis took the passenger to a Westmount Avenue address.

London Hastening Ray's Extradition

LONDON (AP) — The British fovernment started speedy official action on a formal U.S. request Wednesday for the extradition of James Earl Ray to stand trial in Tennessee for the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

By the end of the day the application had cleared its first legal hurdle at the British Forlign Office.

But court fermalities and appeals, if the 40-year-old escaped convict chooses to use them, could delay Ray's return up to gix weeks or even longer should the case take some unexpected turn.

U.S. officials, headed by Asst. Atty. Gen. Fred M. Vinson Jr., chief of the Justice Department's criminal division, beat their self-imposed deadline for handing in the petition by one day.

READIED IN ADVANCE

But parts of the petition, which was at least an inch thick when it was handed in to the Foreign Office by U.S. Consulteneral Jack Herfurt, apparently had been readied in advance of Ray's arrest last Saturday at London Airport as he tried to board a plane for Brussels.

The petition contained a summary of some of the evidence against Ray in King's murder at a Memphis motel April 4. It also contained information on his escape from the Missouri State Prison while serving an armed robbery charge.

The U.S. government is seeking extradition on both counts and must satisfy a British judge that both would also be crimes under British as well as U.S.

The petition also contains fingerprints and other material to identify Ray as the man now being held under round-the-clock guard in London's Wandsworth Prison. Officially he is being held here as Ramon George Sneyd, travelling under a Canadian passport issued in that name and charged with passport officials as carrying a loaded gun.

WITHIN REQUIREMENTS

Within hours after receiving the petition, the Foreign Office et tified that the request fell thin the terms of the 1931 ex-

tradition treaty between the two countries.

It then was sent to the Home Office, roughly comparable to the U.S. Justice Department. There lawyers started a pre-liminary screening to ensure it established a case against Ray, as required by British law.

The Home Office said that if the petition is in order it should be in the hands of Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Frank Milton sometime Thursday.

Under normal procedure Milton would study the petition and schedule a hearing about a week after receiving it.

If Milton grants extradition, Hay has 15 days to appeal to the High Court, and another 14 days to take the case to the House of Lords if his lawyers want to challenge the order on a point of

Ray's court-appointed British lawyer refused all comment on his case. The lawyer, Michael Dresden, specializes in police court cases and was picked to defend him on the passport and gun charges. Ray could request another lawyer for the extradition hearing, and that would delay the case.

LEGAL AUTHORITY

So long as Ray is held here on passport charges, British police have legal authority to investigate his movements during his three weeks in London prior to his arrest. Scotland Yard is coing that.

Jane Nassau, Peceptionist at

one hotel where Ray stayed, told a newsman that the police are looking for another receptionist who checked Ray into the hetel. The other girl flow is on vacation, but Miss Nassau said Scotland Yard wants to find out if someone accompanied Ray when he arrived at the hotel.

The police investigation, carried out at the request and with the cooperation of the FBI, appears directed at determining whether evidence of a conspirate to kill King can be turned up in London.

There was some suspicibn here that Ray may have had an appointment to meet someone in London—perhaps a contact man —who never turned up.

Miss Nassau said Ray had originally been booked to leave the hotel on June 3 and then extended his stay for two more days. When she asked him why, he said: "I'm having trouble with my visa."

Then he moved across town to a secluded hotel with a private telephone number and stayed in his room for four days trying to arrange a flight out of London. By that time, police apparently were on his trail and closing in

Hanes Visits With Ray; **Vows Fight**

LONDON (AP) - James Earl Ray's American lawyer visited him for the first time Friday in a British prison and said afterward Ray will make a court fight against charges of slaying Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

"If this man comes to trial, if he's the man, he will plead not guilty. A plea of not guilty will be entered," Arthur J. Hanes of Birmingham, Ala., told news-men at his London hotel.

He said also that Ray's health and mental attitude were good. Hanes, denied the chance to see Ray during his first visit here last month, returned from Birmingham Friday after learning that British permission for a

visit had been granted.
Accompanied by Michael Eugene, Ray's court-appointed British lawyer for the extradition proceedings here, Hanes took a taxi from downtown London to Wandsworth Prison in a southwest residential area of

the capital. Hanes and Eugene spent 35

minutes in an interview room with Ray. The British lawyer had to be with him because Hanes has no status as a lawyer in this country. Then Hanes left and Eugene spoke to Ray about the British extradition order against him, which is coming up on appeal late this month.

The Alabama lawyer carefully avoided telling newsmen how

he might plot Ray's defense.
"I will not try this man in the newspapers," he said.

But he did indicate he probably would fight any prosecution move for shifting the trial from Memphis, Tenn., where the Negro civil rights leader was shot down least April 4

down last April 4.

"Most of the other citizens of the United States have television and they have got a barrage of information on this case everywhere. I see no point in a change of venue," he said.

Asked about reports he might go for an insanity plea, he stressed that this was "just one of a hundred possibilities" under study.

He also insisted on referring to his client as Ramon George Sneyd, although a British magistrate has held that the prisoner's identity as Ray has been proved. Hanes said it would be up to the prosecution to prove it again in an American court.

He added that he had received three letters from the prison signed "R. G. Sneyd." In general, he said, they covered the man's request for legal representation and for an interview with the American lawyer.

"I have never seen this man before today," Hanes added.

Ray's Appeal Set July 29

LONDON (UPI)—A British court said today it will hear James Earl Ray's appeal against extradition to the United States to stand trial for the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., on July 29.

The surprise announcement was made when Ray appeared at Bow Street Magistrate's Court on charges of violating British gun and immigration

Ray was ordered to appear again July 16 to answer to the charges of carrying a loaded .38-caliber pistol and two forged passports, which got him arrested in the first place June 8. It was expected Paitain might improve the charges if Ray is a company to the charges of the charges Britain might ignore the charges if Ray is extradited.

At the Bow Street Court, Chief London Magistrate Frank Milton asked if a date had been set for the appeal in Queen's Bench Division of the high court of justice.
"Yes sir, July 29," a court official replied.

Ray, whose extradition was ordered a week ago, appeared in court today to meet a British legal requirement that prisoners appear before a magistrate every eight days while they are held.

The announcement on the extradition appeal had been unexpected as the appearance today was supposed to deal only with the gun and passport

Ray appeared in court under the name Ramon George Sneyd, the name listed on one of the two forged Canadian passports Scotland Yard detectives said they pulled from his coat along with the gun at Heathrow airport.

Ray swaggered into the courtroom without the dark hornrim glasses he wore when he was ordered extradited last Tuesday. His jaw twitched but he looked less jittery than in previous appear-

The order Milton issued for Ray's extradition must be approved by Home Secretary James Callaghan even if Ray's appeal is turned down.

Ray's lawyer indicated he would file his appeal of the ruling in district court by early next week.

The lawyer said the British charges likely would "remain on file" if Ray were sent to the United States. This, he said, meant the charges might not actually be dropped in the American sense of the word but would remain active "for the dispution of the count". the discretion of the court."

Officials said Thursday that plans are being made to make a voice and picture tape of every person attending the trial of James Earl Ray, charged with assassinating Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. here on April 4.

This would be the first trial anywhere that such security precaution has been required, Charles Holmes, public relations aide to Sheriff William N.

Newsmen accredited to cover the trial, expected (Continued on Page 6, Col. 1)

to be held in late fall, will be given identification cards bearing their photographs.

The trial is scheduled to be held in one of the Shelby County Criminal Court courtrooms so Ray can be brought directly into the court through an underground corridor without being seen by the outside public.

A secondary security line is expected to be established to keep everyone without pressing business out of the Criminal Courts building.

Ray currently is in jail in London awaiting a hearing on his appeal of an extradition order.

"This is a serious matter," said Sheriff Morris, who is in charge of arrangements for the trial.

"There will be no carnival air here," Morris, said. "The sheriff, the judges and the attorney general have been conferring at intervals for several weeks to assure a fair and orderly trial in a dignified atmosphere."

The trial will be conducted in strict keeping with established standards of dignity and justice,' Dist. Atty. Gen. Phil M. Canale, who will head the prosecution team.

Inspector Warren Cargill has been placed in charge of physical arrangements for the trial, and he is supervising the remodeling of the interior cell in which Ray would be housed if returned from London.

The largest Criminal Courts courtroom can seat slightly over 100 spectators, and a large number of the seats will be assigned to news media representatives covering the trial. Morris said, however, seats would be reserved for relatives of both Ray and King, and some would be kept for the general public.

No photographs will be allowed in the courtroom, although a ruling has not yet been made on whether pictures will be permitted in the corridors.

The last world-famous trial held in Tennessee was in the 1925 "monkey trial" in the little town of Dayton, a trial that tested the validity of a state law prohibiting the teaching of Darwin's theory of evolu-

tion in Tennessee public schools.

The law was upheld and was not repealed until 1967. Tennessee was criticized for what was termed the "carnival atmosphere" surrounding the trial in which John T. Scopes, a young biology teacher, was found guilty. Scopes was fined \$100 but never paid it because of a technicality.
