While talking SAC GAMBLE advised he had received a teletype from the Bureau just then saying the fingerprints did not match.

WILLIAM MARTINDALE, Division VI, whose unit is handling that investigation, advised the Bureau desired the negative type of information we were forwarding by teletype on a daily basis. He stated it was their theory, based on the variances in descriptions in Birmingham and Memphis, there might be two persons involved.

SAC GAMBLE of Birmingham advised that when GALT purchased the automobile he had used the term "barger" which was winknown to the persons he purchased the car from and they asked him what he meant and he said he worked on a barge. GAMBLE said there is some indication this would be the type of language used by a foreigner in describing his work and that when we were checking out leads on the waterfront we should keep this in mind to determine whether or not this is a colloquial term used by people in the U. S. or whether it would be someone who is not from the U. S.

On the evening of 4/4/68, an anonymous telephone call was received by the New Orleans Office of the FBI. The caller claimed that on 4/3/68, he had overheard BERNARD LANSKY make a statement which the caller felt might have a bearing on the assassination. LANSKY was observed to give money to an unknown white male at the Downtowner Motel, Memphis, Tennessee. Hotels and Motels at Alexandria, La., contacted and names of registered guests indicating addresses as Memphis, Tenn., and other areas in Tennessee obtained.

Violent outbursts, triggered by the death of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., have swept over many Northern and Eastern cities in the last three days, and the damage from these scenes of riot and arson will mount into the millions of dollars.

It is, in our opinion, a tribute to Lake [Charles citizens of both races that Lake Charles has been free of violence connected with the slaying of the civil rights

Leaders of both races have expressed shock and dismay at the slaying, but there have been no outbreaks of violence, and no talk of violence.

Quite the contrary.

We attribute this to the fact that there are reasonable men in positions of authority who can speak and act for both maces. and who have labored unceasingly to keep the relationships between the races peaces ful and to keep the lines of communications open.

Early in his administration as mayor, Alfred Roberts set up an informal inforracial committee to keep him informed on the needs and feelings of his constituents. Mayor James Sudduth has maintained that practice.

Those in authority have worked quietly but effectively to increase the number of public jobs open to Negroes. They have sought to upgrade Negro education where it has needed to be upgraded. Public support has been afforded such programs as Head Start, the Job Corps, and the Gall Assistance Program.

Negroes in the Lake Charles area achieved the ballot years before most Southern Negroes did so, and they have used the ballot well. They have been able to make their position known, and they have become strong enough politically to be important in the eyes of the politicians.

Lake Charles is far from perfect, of course, as far as a majority of its Negro citizens are concerned. They would like to have better streets, better living condi-tions, less crowded schools and everything. that a majority of the city's white citizens

Charles still has a long way to go. But they also have the reeling that they are part of the community here. They are not forgotten ciphers, dehumanized and hopeless, as Indicate page, name of are so many Negroes in the ghettos of the great cities.

NEAR STANDSTILL

Quiet, Tense City Mourns King's Death

With many public and private institutions closed or operating with skeleton crews, New Orleanians paid tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King today in an atmosphere that was basically quiet, but tense.

While final rites for the slain civil rights leader

were being held in Atlanta, some Negroes marched to the Civic Center here for a noon memorial service.

All public and parochial cshools and universities in the city shut their doors for the day and many businesses and civic groups delayed the start of their activities until after the funeral.

ONE GROUP of young Negro students, about 200 strong, walked quietly from London ave. and N. Broad toward the Civic Center. The students, from Dillard, Xavier and Louisiana State University in New Orleans, carried a black flag and coffin, on the top of which was painted, "I Have a Dream—1929-1968."

Its spokesman, Harold Vann, who identified himself as a sophomore student at Dillard, said the group was a "cross-section of interested students."

Civil rights leaders also were using the occasion to press demands for more job opportunities and better housing (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)

Mayor Victor H. Schiro, who yesterday met with Negro leaders of what is called the Negro Summit Conference, announced today he has agreed to hire a Negro aide and put him into his office within 10 days.

The mayor said his biggest, problem would be "finding room in my front office for a new desk" and he said the City Council had agreed "to put up the money to hire a new man."

MEANWHILE, municipal services were hard hit today by officially sanctioned absenteeism, after the mayor agreed to grant leave for those workers wishing to take part in the memorial services.

A spokesman for the sanitation department said that 220 out of 300 men assigned to garbage routes did not report for work. There was no garbage and trash pickup today but the department expected to make collections on the usual Wednesday routes tomorrow.

ONLY STANDBY emergency crews were on duty in the street department and the Sewerage and Water Board.

Street maintenance reported 90 per cent of its workers absent with leave. About the same situation prevailed at

the Sewerage and Water Board.

The Parkway and Park Commission gave leave to 95 per cent of its approximately 340 employes and operated with skeleton crews and office staff.

One of the businesses remaining open was the Grey-hound Bus Station, which held two memorial services in the station this morning. A priest from St. Joseph Church officiated.

In his press conference today, the mayor said the Negro aide he plans to hire would have the title of coordinator.

"HIS JOB will be to coordinate relations and activities between my office and the Negro community."

"Inasmuch as the population of the city is more than 40 per cent Negro, I think a Negro coordinator would fulfill a great need," he said.

The mayor said he doesn't know whom he will hire.

"I'll have to review my mind," he said. He noted

that the city employs about 2,000 Negroes, 500 of whom are on the Civil Service list.

Yesterday, the Negro leaders contended that department heads consistently pass over qualified Negroes in selecting Civil Service employes.

On this, the mayor said, "We are going to follow through on our directive that department heads hire on the basis of merit, not color. It is my hope that if a Negro is among the top three applicants for a given job that he will not be passed over."

ON HOUSING, Schiro again blasted the Municipal Courts. He said the city takes violation cases to court and there finds that "the enforcement is terribly lenient. Landlords find that it easier to pay a light fine than to fix up their slums."

The mayor said he wasn't sure of the legality of current proposals that the tenants be empowered to withhold rents when landlords refuse to remedy substandard dwellings.

"However, this is a situation that the landlords cause and they are going to have to confront it. Too many unscrupulous landlords have been permitting tenants to live in vermin-infested dwellings.

"The city is doing what it can to correct the situation."
Our forces are limited, though."

AMONG THOSE converging on the Civic Center were the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, which marched from the Union Bethel A. M. E. Church at 2321 Thalia.

The Retail Merchants Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce of the New Orleans Area said member stores closed their doors until noon "out of reverence and respect" for the Negro leader.

Members of the Retail Grocers of the Greater New Orleans Metropolitan Area also opened their stores at noon.

ORLEANS PARISH School Board President Victor H. Hess Jr. said the board had decided to close schools today to respect the "feeling of students and teachers who wish to pay tribute to Dr. King."

All public schools will reopen tomorrow, he said.

In Jefferson Parish, parochial schools were closed but public schools remained open

The Rev. Louis F. Generes, superintendent of Catholic achools, said that classes suspended today would resume tomorrow.

Murray C. Fincher, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the Greater New Orleans Area, said:

"We must reaffirm our determination to follow the path of law and order and to reject violence. Now of all times is the test of our belief in brotherhood and our dedication to peaceful solutions.

"Irresponsibility now can only compound the tragedy and postpone longer the attainment of the goals of justice and humanity which are the aspirations of people of all races and creeds."

Classes at Diliard, Loyola and Tulane universities, Louisiana State University in New Orleans, Southern University in New Orleans and Delgado college were all suspended today. Tulane will resume classes April 16, while Loyola and SUNO open again on April 17. LSUNO students return to classes tomorrow.

Xavier University also closed its doors today and will reopen April 17.

The march ended at City Hall where a petition containing "demands long sought by Dr. King for the poor people of America" was to be presented to city officials.

Facilities at the YMCA were closed. The city's new Human Relations Committee canceled its meeting scheduled today. Some of the committee members reportedly attended Dr. King's Atlanta funeral. The meeting was rescheduled for Thursday at 11:30 a. 22.

Inspector SULLIVAN said he had forwarded photographs to the office and the employee at the binocular store likes picture #2. This picture looks like JEROME WALLIS VIRNON.

He said that they had GALT going in through Laredo, Texas, out of Birmingham on 10/7/67, giving his destination as Mexico City; saying he was single and employed in Birmingham. They do not show what he used for identification to get into Mexico. U. S. authorities show no Mexico exit at this time. Los Angeles allegedly had him in Los Angeles on 11/14/67.

The difference in the description between GALT and VERNON is that GALT allegedly has piercing blue eyes and VERNON has brown eyes. According to SULLIVAN, VERNON's description is too large. They are looking into the possibility of contact lenses.
