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Mr. HARRY SERO, 295 North McNeil, Memphis, Tennessee, advised that he is former innate No. 01903J at the Missouri State Penitentiary (MSP), Jefferson City, Missouri.

SERO said he first came to Memphis, Tennessee, on about January 13, 1962, at which time he was wanted in Missouri for having violated his parole from the MSP. Upon his arrival in Memphis he went to work as a house remodeler, later working in a Gulf service station at the corner of Jefferson and Lauderdale Streets. SERO took over management of this station in about April 1962 and operated it until November 21, 1962, at which time he left Memphis after having gotten into trouble with the local police for having written some bad checks. SERO said he first went from Memphis to Pennsylvania to visit relatives and continued to run until he finally settled in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and went to work in a Texaco service station.

On February 14, 1964, SERO was arrested in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and was returned to the MSP where he was put in "B" block. He remained there from sometime in February 1964 until about June 12, 1964, at which time SERO was turned over on rendition to the State of Tennessee.

During the approximately four months that SERO was in the MSP he became friendly with JAMES EARL RAY. SERO also was acquainted with another inmate, one RAYMOND CURTIS, who has recently talked to newspaper reporters concerning his association with RAY. SERO said he can recall making the statement in the presence of RAY and CURTIS and other inmates that while he, SERO, had been in Memphis some unknown individual had speculated that if MARTIN LUTHER KING had ever attempted an economic boycott in the city of Memphis, it would be worth a large amount of money to Memphis businessmen to have KING killed. SERO said this conversation had actually taken place in his presence in Memphis but it had been mere speculation and had had no basis in fact. He said he later related this conversation to his prisonmates merely to make conversation and had not intended to imply that any person

or group of persons had or were even contemplating placing a bounty on MARTIN LUTHER KING.

SERO stated that after being returned to Tennessee he was sentenced to three years for uttering forged checks and was incarcerated in the Tennessee State Penitentiary at Ft. Pillow. He said he believes he also related this same speculative conversation to inmates at the Ft. Pillow Prison.

SERO described JAMES EARL RAY as a "hayseed" and a "born loser." He said that to his knowledge RAY had never successfully gotten away with any criminal offense, and it was his belief that RAY had been detected and apprehended following each of his criminal offenses. He said it was his recollection that RAY had a great dislike for Negroes but he cannot recall that he particularly disliked MARTIN LUTHER KING. He said he would not describe RAY as a loner but would simply say he would not know how to make friends or how to mix with other persons. He said that RAY was a regular user of amphetamines in prison but he did not know him to use other narcotics, and he recalled that RAY had mentioned taking narcotic pills prior to being incarcerated.

SERO said that RAY has a deep need for recognition and that he idolizes notorious criminals who are the subjects of wide-spread publicity. He said that when he considers RAY's need for recognition and then considers his dislike for Negroes, it is believable that RAY might have killed MARTIN LUTHER KING for no monitary gain.

He said that RAY had no important criminal connections to his knowledge as criminals of this type would not bother to associate with RAY. He said RAY never talked about his family but did indicate on one occasion that he had friends in Kansas City, Missouri. SERO said he has not heard from RAY since he left MSP, and he has no idea where he might be at present.

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# INTERVIEWS WITH PERSONS WHO RENTED ROOMS AT ECONOMY ROOMING HOUSE, BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA

The following investigation was conducted by SA RAYMOND J. MAXWELL on April 12, 1968:

O. L. BLACK, Route 5, Box 227, Andalusia, Alabama, telephone number 222-1508, telephonically advised that he had not been in Birmingham, Alabama, and did not stay at the Economy Rooming House on Highland Avenue; however, it was his wife, Mrs. O. L. BLACK, and his daughter, Mrs. JAMES E. WELDON, who stayed at the rooming house.

BLACK advised that the name of ERIC STARVO GALT means nothing to him, and that to his knowledge, he has never heard of ERIC STARVO GALT, nor has he ever heard of HARVEY LOWMEYER.

Mrs. O. L. BLACK, telephonically advised that during the fall of 1967 she and her daughter, Mass WELDON. Route 4, Box 73, Opelika, Alabama, took to Birmingham, Alabama, for medical treatment. While they were in Birmingham, they stayed at the Economy Rooming House on Highland Avenue. She recalls staying in Rooms 18 and 29 during the period of September 17 through September 24, 1967. Mrs. BLACK advised that when she was not at the hospital was being treated, she would be resting where in her room at the Economy Rooming House and she did not mingle with or associate with other people staying at the rooming house. On occasions, she would talk briefly with other women at the rooming house, but she never engaged in any conversation with any men.

Mrs. BLACK advised that the name of GALT and the name of LOWMEYER are not familiar to her, and she definitely does not remember anyone at the rooming house by the name of GALT or LOWMEYER. She stated that if she saw a picture of GALT, she might be able to state whether she had ever seen this individual at the rooming house, but from a description she could not state whether she saw anyone answering GALT's description at the rooming house.

Mrs. BLACK stated that she would cooperate in any way that she could with the FBI, and if the FBI had any pictures

that they wanted her to look at, she would be glad to look at these pictures in an effort to determine if anyone was at the Economy Rooming House during the period of time when she stayed at the rooming house in September, 1967.

The following investigation was conducted by SA HOWARD R. LINSCOTT on April 13, 1968 at Andalusia, Alabama:

Mrs. O. L. BLACK, Route 5, Box 227, Andalusia, Alabama, was shown the sketch of the suspect ERIC STARVO GALT. Mrs. BLACK advised that she had never seen anyone at the rooming house in Birmingham who resembled the photograph. Mrs. BLACK advised that she resided at the rooming house during the period September 17-24, 1067, at which time she was in Birmingham to see about who was in the hospital there. Mrs. BLACK advised that the only time she saw any men around the rooming house was in the mornings at breakfast time; however, she stated she had never seen anyone at breakfast who resembled the photograph.

The following investigation was conducted at Opelika, Alabama, by SA ROY H. EVELAND:

On April 12, 1968, JAMES E. WELDON, 23 Dorsey Street, mail address, Route 4, Box 73, Opelika, Alabama, an employee of Ampex Corporation, advised that his wife, SHELLEY WELDON, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. OVIS LEE BLACK, Route 5, Box 227, Andalusia, Alabama, had stayed at the Economy Rooming House, Birmingham. Alabama, for several days during part of 1967. His was having an operation and his wife would stay at the hospital with during the nights and sleep at the rooming house The mother-in-law would stay with the during the days. at thehospital during the days and would sleep at the rooming house at night. He and his wife have been taking to the Crippled Children's Hospital in Birmingham for five years for corrective operations. He and his wife generally stay at the Economy Rooming House when in Birmingham. He said that if he had been at the Economy Rooming House during September, 1967, it would have been only for an overnight visit. He does not remember anyone at his rooming house by the name of GALT or a similar name and could not place anyone fitting the description as given for suspect ERIC STARVO GALT.

Mrs. JAMES E. (SHELLEY) WELDON, Route 4, Box 73, Opelika, advised on April 12, 1968 that she recalls staying at the Economy Rooming House in Birmingham, Alabama, September 17-24, 1968. She and her mother OVIS LEE BLACK, of Andalusia, Alabama, were there with who was a patient at the Crippled Children's Hospital in Birmingham. She said she did not recall anyone by the name ERIC STARVO GALT or any similar name at this rooming house and she does not recall anyone there fitting the description as given for suspect GALT.

### AT AUBURN, ALABAMA:

On April 12, 1968 it was ascertained that THOMAS D. FRANKLIN was residing at the Phi Theta Tau, 317 S. College Street, Auburn, Alabama, while attending Auburn University. It was ascertained that on that date he was away from Auburn believed to be attending the Masters Golf Tournament in Augusta, Georgia.

On April 15, 1968, FRANKLIN was contacted on his return to Auburn and advised he had stayed at the Economy Rooming House, 2608 Highland Avenue, Birmingham, for about two weeks during the last part of August and early September, 1967. He advised he was working at the Avondale Mills in North Birmingham under the Co-op Program of Auburn University.

FRANKLIN said that he had seen articles in the newspaper recently, including a sketch of suspect in the killing
of MARTIN LUTHER KING at Memphis, Tennessee. He said that he
did not know anyone by the name of ERIC STARVO GALT, and he
does not recall anyone at the Economy Rooming House who
looked like the sketch of the suspect which he had seen in the
newspaper. He also said he does not recall seeing anyone
around the rooming house driving a white Mustang automobile.

Lieutenant A. S. ZELINSKI, Inspectional Bureau, Memphis Police Department, Memphis, Tennessee, advised that he and Lieutenant J. L. HARRISON met Memphis City Engineer ARTHUR C. HOLBROOK, P. E., Tennessee License No. 4, and a surveying crew at the Lorraine Motel on April 23, 1968, at 8:30 a.m. Certain engineering measurements were subsequently taken.

Lieutenant ZELINSKI advised that an engineer's transit was placed over the spot where Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., was shot, the telescope being positioned 59 inches above the balcony floor. This height was based on information contained in the autopsy report of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., which indicated that the missile entered his body at a point 59 inches above the right heel with the head positioned to correspond with the path of the missile. He stated that the point where Dr. KING was standing when shot was indicated to them by Reverend JAMES BEVEL, a representative of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, who was staying at the Lorraine Motel.

From this position, two triangles were established with a baseline common to the two triangles established and measured. Every effort was made to ensure accuracy. It was determined that the level distance from the second floor rear bathroom window sill of 4222 South Main Street to the point where Dr. KING was standing on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel was 206.36 feet and the in-line distance from the window sill to the point where Dr. KING was standing was 207.02 feet. The window sill at the rear of 422 South Main was determined to be 16.63 feet higher than a point 59 inches above the floor of the balcony of the Lorraine Motel at the location Dr. KING was standing when he was shot. The downward angle of the direct in-line distance from the second floor window sill at the rear of 4222 South Main to a point 59 inches above the balcony of the Lorraine Motel at the point where Dr. KING was standing was determined to be 4 degrees 36 minutes 25 seconds.

1. On the morning of Outober 1, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Ernest Franklin, \$67447, on innote at the Medium Security Prison at Moherly. Fromklin is a Megro innote, see 44, from St. Louis, Missouri, and is one of the subjects who was stabled in the turnel at the State Prison in Jefferson City, Missouri, on the evening of June 8, 1964. The subject is presently serving a fifteen year sentence for assault with intent to kill from St. Louis City and was committed to the prison in September of 1963. Franklin has a fifth grade education and is able to read and write.

2. Franklin gave the following account of happenings at the prison on June 8, 1964;

"On the night of the stebbing, I was welking up the tunnel with Simsons and we had just passed the chaptain's door but had not reached the corner. All of a suiden, several white fellows came around the corner facing us. They all had buives in their hands. They were wearing hoods over their heads and faces. The boods had holes out in them for eyes. They started yelling and one fellow stabbed Simons right in the heart. Simons fell back against me and then wheeled and went running back toward A Hall. Then four of them had me. One of them stabbed me in the left chest and the knife just missed my heart. The second built hit me in the lower part of my back on the left side and the blade came on through and out of my right groin. I looked down and can 3 or 4 inches of the blade sticking out. When the first fellow hit me with the knife in the chest, I started fighting and holding to the knife and that is when I was hit in the back. Then I got stuck twice more in the back. I never did fall to the floor. About that time, these hooded fellows said, "Let's get out of here." I did not see Mitchell or Perks get cut. I don't know none of the people what out us. While I was holding the one fellow's lmife, I heard one of them say "Not him, not him." They was talking about Banks. He is in the clique. I think he know what was going to happen and knows who the white fellows are. I saw Banks talking to two white fellows down at the recreation year that evening and it looked like one of them had a lmife in his pocket."

2. Franklin stated that he would testify in court, however he still feared for his life, even though he had been transferred to Moberly. Franklin viewed

photographs of Chester Eley, William Burke, Richard Laws, Donald Bussmayer, Walter Douglas, and Robert Burns and readily picked out Burke and Eley as the two white subjects he had observed talking with Banks and he identified Burke as the subject who had the knife in his pocket.

2. On the morning of October 16, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed six immates of the Missouri State Prison who were named by witnesses as being suspects in the stabbing of four colored immates on the evening of June 8, 1964. The suspects interviewed are listed below.

- a. William Harry Burks, #07738, white, male, ago 30, from St. Louis, Missauri. He is now serving four years for burglery, larceny, and escape from St. Louis, Missauri, and entered the prison December 6, 1963. He has previously served two years for auto theft from St. Louis in 1952, eight years for burglery, larceny, and escape from Cole County in 1954, two years for destruction of State property, Cole County, in 1959, and two years for burglery and larceny, Caps Cirardesu County, in 1961. Eurhe has a seventh grade education.
- b. Donald Richard Bussneyer, \$71843, white, male, age 28, from St. Louis, Missouri. He is presently serving fourteen years for robbery and assault from St. Louis, Missouri, and entered the prison in 1956. He has also served one year for attempted burglary in Oklahoma in 1954. He has an eighth grade education.
- o. Walter Robert Douglas, #C2101, white, male, age 20, from St. Louis, Missouri. He is serving eight years for burglary and steeling from St. Louis County and entered the prison in February of 1961. He is a high school graduate.
- d. Chester Lee Eley, \$005.6, white, male, age 30, from St. Louis, Missouri. He is now serving nine years for armed robbery from St. Louis and entered the prison June 3, 1960. He also served five years for armed robbery from St. Louis in March, 1957. He served two years in El Rano, Oklahoma (Federal), in 1951 for the Dyer Act and eighteen months in El Rano in 1952 for escape (Federal). He has an eighth grade education.
- e. Richard Allen Laws, #03230, white, male, ege 20, from St. Louis, Missouri. The subject is now serving six and one-half years for escape, burglary, and stealing from Cole County and entered the prison in July of 1961. He was sentenced to Becaville for delinguency from St. Louis County in July of 1960 and transferred from Becaville to Algos Reformatory in February, 1961. He has a tenth grade education.

- f. Robert E. Burns, #75811, white, male, ege 33, from St. Louis, Missouri. Ee is serving 75 years for robbery from St. Louis City and entered the prison in 1959. He was sentenced to two years in Boonville in 1945 from St. Louis for muto theft. He was sentenced to five years in the Algoa Reformatory in 1949 from St. Louis for robbery. He was sentenced to five years in the State Prison in 1954 from St. Louis for robbery and has an eighth grade education.
- 2. All of the above subjects were interviewed in the office of Major Poiry. All denied any knowledge of the stabbings on the evening of June 8, 1964. All refused the opportunity to take a polygraph examination. Subjects Russmeyer and Laws became angry when questioned about the stabbings. Several of the above suspects stated that whenever there was trouble inside the walls they were always picked up as suspects.

1. On the efferment of September 24, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed David Joseph McCutcheca #01969-J, on immake of the Missouri State Prison. McCutcheca is a white male subject, age 46, from Vausau, Victoria. He is presently serving a twenty-five year sentence for armed robbery from Jackson County, Missouri, and entered the prison in January, 1961. He has numerous other convictions as follows: car theft in 1935 and served a one to two year sentence in Visconsin, forgery in 1939 and served a one to two year sentence in Visconsin, carrel knowledge in 1941 and served a one to three year sentence in Visconsin, transporting a minor across a state line in 1943 and served eighteen months in Leuvenworth, Kansas (Federal), burglary in 1950 and served fifteen years in California. The subject has an eighth grade education and has completed some schooling in the penitentiary beyond the eighth grade. The interview took place in the prison office of Major Foiry from 1:10 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

2. McCutcheon gave the following account of activities in the prison on the evening of June 8, 1964:

"About 6:15 to 6:20 Monday night, June 8, 1964, I was down at the recreation field near the #1 ball disabnit where the Playboys and Star Dusters were playing tell. Slick Stidles is manager of the Star Dusters and Busineyer is manager of the Playboys. While I was there I was up at the recreation equipment check out room and I observed knives being given out by Sushank to Chester Eley, Milly Burke, Bussneyer, and Douglas. I also seen Rex Peck with a knife, but I don't know where he got it. I asked Suchant what was up and he said, 'They are going to have a reable'. I thought it was going to be on the yard. I left the yard about 6:30 p.m. and made my way to the typer recreation area to get eway from the brouble and took a speaker box out and set it up for the outside movies. On my way back I looked in through the last window of the turnel and I saw Busessyer stick a built in a colored man. Busemeyor was holding a rag up to his face with his left hand and had the builte in his right band. Disameyer came up behind the colored ARCHED men and stabled him in the back. He stabled him up about the SERIALIZED /// shoulders and the colored man span around and he stuck him in the storach just under the ribs. Buskneyer ren down toward F and C

were running every direction and yelling. I saw two other fellows run by with masks or something on their heads. I did not know them".

3. McCutcheon advised the undersigned officer that he would testify in court if necessary, and that the above information was true to the best of his knowledge. He was unable to identify the colored subject he saw stabbed. He stated that he felt the reasons for the stabbing incidents were race hatred, and the fact that some of the prison hot heads felt that the more heat they could bring on the prison would better their chances of moving out the warden.

1. On the efternoon of September 22, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Guard Captain Glen F. Troyer, age 54, New Blocafield, Missouri. Troyer has been an employee at the prison for a number of years and was on duty there on the evening of June 8, 1964, when the stabbings occurred. This interview was held in the prison office of Vajor Poiry.

- 2. Captain Troyer gave the following information with reference to the stabbing incident: About 6:45 p.m., June 8, 1964, Troyer was on duty in the Canteen when a group of immates went through the tunnel toward F and G Hall. After some of the immates had gone cut of sight of Troyer around the corner of the tunnel he beard one man screen and part of the travel case running back toward the control caster past Troyer. Troyer states that one colored subject named Mitchell had been stabled in the back and as he came running by, Troyer showed him through the control caster gate cut of the tunnel. Then sucther colored subject named Fronklin came by. He was bleeding in the front and Troyer showed him through the control center gate. Troyer stated that he did not know how or when the colored subject Simmons went by him, however, this could have occurred while he was putting one of the other injured subjects through the gate.
- 3. Proper stated that he then took a group of white immates down through the turnel toward F and G Hall, and that as he rounded the corner he found three small knives on the floor. All of the knives appeared to be clean at that time. He also found two cloth masks near the chapel door and three more knives in the shower rose doorway. One was a big knife and was bloody. One was a dagger type knife about six or seven inches long and it was also bloody. The third knife was without blood. Theyer took all of the above items to the control center and turned them in. He further stated that he saw no actual stabbing or cutting but did assist in getting the injured subjects out of the turnel and then placing the other insutes in their cells in A, F, and G Halls after the incident.

1. On the afternoon of September 22, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Jeseph Beattie Van Alst \$74696, an impate of the Missouri State Prison. The interview took place in the prison office of Major Poiry. Van Alst is a white male subject, age 39. He is presently serving a twenty-five year sentence for felonious assemble. He entered the prison in December, 1958. He has previously served a five year term for robbery first starting in 1953 in the State Prison in McAllister, Oklahema. Van Alst stated that he had completed the sixth grade and was able to read and write.

2. Van Alst gave the following account of the occurrences at the prison on the evening of June 8, 1964:

"About 6:45 p.m., June 8, 1964, I was in the tunnel between the chapel foor and the corner. I saw Bobby Burns and Richard Laws there. They had on white cloth macks up to eye level. They jumped out of the line. Bobby jumped out of the line next to the windows and grabbed this colored boy who was running toward the hall yelling and it locked like he hald him and I saw Richard laws stick a knife in the colored man's back on the lower left side just above the belt. The colored man then ran back toward the tunnel opening yelling, 'th, th, th', and holding his stomich. Laws and Burns stood there a minute. Then I ducked in the shower and say them take off their masks and then laws. came into the phoner without a mask and was carrying a shirt in his hand. About three minutes later I saw Burns and Laws washing their bands in their cells and each had blood on his hands. I don't know what they done with the knife. The knife was shiny and was twelve to fourteen inches long and about an inch and a helf wide. It had five or six inches of blood on it when they pulled it out of the colored boy".

3. Wen Alst told the underwigned officer that he had observed other subjects in the tunnel wearing masks but could only recognize the ones named above. He stated he did not know the names of the colored subjects who were victims in the stabbings but falt he saight be able to identify the one he had observed from photographs. He looked at photographs of Franklin, Parks, Witchell, and NDEXEL

Simmons and stated that the one he had observed was either Franklin or Simmons. Van Alst stated that he would testify to the above facts in court as he wanted to see justice done.

- 1. On the morning of September 21, 1964, the undersigned officer contacted Warden E. V. Mash at the Missouri State Prison, Jefferson City, Missouri, as per your instructions. Warden Mash stated that the Cole County Prosecuting Attorney and the prison authorities felt that an cutside agency should interrogate the subjects and witnesses involved in the stabbing incidents which occurred at the prison on June 8, 1964. Mash indicated that most of these immates had been interrogated previously by prison officials and that memorous stories had been told.
- 2. Warden Mash indicated that several immates claimed to have been witnesses to the stabbings and he furnished the names of eight immates. He further indicated that information received by the prison authorities indicated that the subjects responsible for the stabbings were Richard Levs #03230, Robert E. Burns #75811, William H. Burke #07738, Chester Lee Eley #00846, Donald Bussmeyer #71843, and Walter Douglas #02161.
- 3. On the morning of September 22, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Leslie Allen Achter #75595 in the office of Major Poiry at the prison. Achter is a white male subject from Charleston, Missouri. He is presently serving a ten year sentence from Mississippi County for assault with intent to do bodily harm with a deadly weapon. He entered the prison on this sentence June, 1959. He previously served a four year term in the prison for burglary and larceny from Mississippi County starting in August, 1955. Achter stated he has no education and was unable to read or write. In interviewing Achter he appeared to be above normal in his thinking and memory and was able to describe in detail the actions he had witnessed on the evening of June 8, 1964. Achter stated that the information he furnished was true and correct to the best of his knowledge and that he was willing to testify in court.

4. Achter gave the following account of occurrences on the evening of June 8, 1964:  $44/-160-63^{\frac{6}{2}}$ 

"On the evening of June 8, 1964, about 5:15 p.m., I left F Hall where I cell in 127. I went to the ball fields to #3 diamond. I STARCHED Bobby Griffin go to the recreation equipment check out room the product he rolled up a bunch of knives in some old underwear and put them under his arm. He got the knives from Sushank and Harry Comps. MAY 2

Sushank passed the knives out of the window. Griffin went back to the #1 diamond where he passed the knives out to Tony Eno, Billy Burke, Chester Eley, Billy Hicks, Rex Peck, Lloyd Ketcherside, and Douglas. Bussmeyer was coaching first base and when his team came in to bat he walked over to the check out room and Sushank gave him his knife. It was wrapped up in a dirty rag. He stuck it inside of his jacket and walked back to his team and started coaching first base. A foul tip was hit and it rolled toward Bussmeyer and the wall. He kicked the ball so that it bounced from the wall into his hands, as he could not bend over to pick up the ball on account of the knife stuck inside of his jacket and pants. At that time I saw the middle part of the knife when his jacket gapped opened. About 6:20 p.m. I left and went to #3 diamond to meet my buddy, Billy Joe Davis, and give him some instant coffee.

"While I was talking to Davis and Harold Enlos, Bussmeyer and Douglas come around the back stop and Bussmeyer said, 'Let's see if the god darm warden will put this in the paper', and he named some St. Louis newspaper. Bussneyer and Douglas took off and left the line and went across the yard to the tunnel opening at the control center. When Davis, Joker Jones, and I went through the tunnel and turned the corner we saw Douglas and Busameyer standing with their backs to us and both tying handkerchiefs around their necks. When they turned around facing us they pulled the handkerchiefs up to their eyes. This happened near the door of what used to be the old hobby shop and is now the Protestant Chapel. This was out in the tunnel. Douglas said, 'Hold the line up', but everybody kept coming. He was holding a knife in his left hand about chest high. The knife was about nine inches long, was sharp on each edge, and had a blunt point. I would know the knife if I could see it again. Bussmayer reached down and picked up a knife with his left hand and turned around facing us and said, 'This is no joke, hold this line up'. This knife had a blunt point with a hole in the center of the blade at the point. It was about two inches wide and eighteen to twenty-four inches long, not counting the handle. It looked like a sword or a corn knife. We all lined up along the outside wall of the tunnel. Davis was right behind me and Joker Jones was behind him and he was yelling, 'Give me room' and shoving around. He shoved Davis and I out of the line and Bussmeyer said, 'Make two lines', so I stopped over and they started making the other line behind me. Bussneyer had the long knife right in my face. He said, 'O.K., bud, hold it right there and you won't get hurt'. When we formed two lines Bussmeyer said, 'All right, bring them on'. The play started at the back of the line. This one colored fellow ran all the way to the front of the line to about even with the chapel door where he was tripped up by Chester Eley. He flipped as he fell and while he was down Douglas stabbed

at his chest. Bussmeyer said, 'Let me have him', and he kicked his head back and stuck the long knife in the pit of the colored man's stomach, right below his ribs. The colored man was yelling and screaming. When Bussmeyer still had the knife in the colored man's stomach the fellow tried to jerk the mask down and Bussmeyer turned to hide his face. Bussmeyer went on down the tunnel and dumped the knife either in the rest room or the shower and threw his cap in a barrel. The colored man ran out of the tunnel near the control center and fell in the yard at the front of the A Hall where he died. Some of the colored boys that got out celled in F Hall and had been there a week or a week and a half. I think this whole thing happened because of race hate."

- 5. After giving the above information to the undersigned officer, Achter again stated he would testify to these facts of his cun free will.
- 6. As other witnesses in the stabbing incidents are interviewed, information furnished by them will be forwarded in report form.

1. On the morning of October 2, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed les Andrew Holt, #07733, en immate of the Missouri State Prison. The interview was held in the day room at the Church Farm. Holt is a white male, age 42, from St. Louis, Missouri. He is presently serving a three year sentence for burglery from St. Louis City and was admitted to the prison on December 6, 1963. He previously served a seven year sentence for armed robbery and stealing from St. Louis City and was released in March of 1963. Holt has a sixth grade education.

2. Holt gave the following account of occurrences at the prison on the evening of June 8, 1964:

"On Monday evening, June 8, 1954, we had been down in the yard and was going back to F and C halls through the tunnel. I had gone around the corner of the turnel toward F Hall. Someone yelled "Hold it" and I stopped and looked up and there stood two gays with hoods on one they had clubs. Then I heard this noise behind me and I turned and looked toward the corner. I saw Jerry Barker beating this colored boy. Barker was not wearing a hood or a mask. I saw Bill Burke hit the colored boy with a knife several times. He stuck him in the back 3 or 4 times and then in the front. Burke had a total or 🗀 rag over his head but it slipped off while he was cutting and I caw him. I also saw Chester Kley with a mask on and a knife in his hard but I did not see him cut anyone. Burke had a komeande kuife about 12 inches long. Eley had a knife that looked like a sword. The colored man broke away and case right by se. He had bloody holes in his back and front. I did not know him but he was an older fellow end had grey in his bair. He rea past me and saw the two men with hoods on that had stopped the lime ahead of him so he turned around and came back by me, running and yelling and went around the corner going toward the control center opening. The two guys up front took their hoods off and faded into the crowd. Burks and Blay faded into the crowd and valled toward P and 6 halls." 44-760-6356

3. Holt stated that he would testify in court to the above facts but did not went to do so while he was still an impact at the prison.

1. On the aftermoon of September 28, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Robert William Mitchell #00844, an immate of the Missouri State Prison. Mitchell is a negro male, age 29, from St. Louis, Missouri. Mitchell entered the prison June 2, 1960, to serve an eight year term for maps and burglary from St. Louis City. He previously served two years in 1958 at Alges for armed robbery from St. Louis City. Mitchell has an eleventh grade education. The interview was hold in the prison office of Major Poixy.



2. Mitchell gave the following account of happenings at the prison on June 8, 1964:



"On Manday evening about 6:45, June 8, 1964, I had been down at the ball game and then we came back from the yard I walked and talked part of the way with Eustreyer. We talked about the ball game that his term, the Flayboys, lost to Slick Stidhem's Star Desters. When we entered the turnel I slowed down to wait for Benke, who had stopped at the Consissary. Duscaryer went on shead. Ranks came out and we started on through the tunnel toward the hobby shop. When we got down close to the chapel door Simons case running from around the corner and ran past us going toward A Hall. He was yelling, 'Ch Jesus', Oh Jesus'. He was bleeding from the chest and down the front. I did not see anyone hit him. Franklin then came running from around the corner holding his chest with both hands. To was bleeding from the chest. He also went past us cooling toward A Hall. Then those fellows with hoods over their heads came around the corner facing us. They all had knives and several of them jusped on me. I got stuck in the upper right arm, the right side, and in the storech. In the bunch that jumped on me, I recognized Billy Burks and Chester Eley. I recognized Burks from his build and Eley I knew by his shoes. I knew the shoes because I had regained them in the shoe shop. Both of them had bloody knives in their hands and hoods on their heads. After that I held onto the railing in the tunnel and did not see any more of the action. Parks and Banks brought me out of the tunnel".

3. Mitchell looked at several photographs and readily identified the photographs

of Burko and Eley. He stated that he was due to be discharged from the prison in Movember or December, 1964, and would be willing to testify in court if he is out, but would be afraid to testify if he was still an immate. He stated that his mother, Flore Mitchell, lives at 1709a North Union Bouleverd, St. Louis, Miscouri, and he could be reached through her.

 On the afternoon of September 25, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Howard Lawrence Ransey #08415, an invete of the Missouri State Prison. Ransey is a white male, age 34, from St. Louis, Missouri. He is presently serving an eight year sentence for robbery from St. Louis and came to the penitentiary in April, 1964. He has previously served three years at the Training School in Boonville for stealing from St. Francois County in 1944, two years in Algoa for escape from St. Louis County in 1946, thirty months in Terre Eaute, Indiana (Federal) for the Dyer Act in 1951, two years at the Missouri State Fenitentiary for burglary from St. Louis County in 1954, thirty months in Leavenworth, Kenses (Federal) for the Dyer Act in 1959, thirty months in Leavenworth, Kensas (Federal) for escape in 1960. The subject received his high school certificate while in prison in Leavenvorth, Kenses. The interview took place in the prison office of Major Poiry.



Remsey gave the following account of hampenings at the prison on the evening of June 8, 1964:

"I was down at the recreation yard on Monday evening about 5:30 or 6:00 p.m. and I can Laus and Billy Burks go to the check out room whore Sushank banded them a bunch of knives out of the back door. The knives were not wrapped up and I got a good look, as I was only about eight or ten steps away. They stuck them under their belts under their shirts and walked down to the ball diamond. I saw Durke give Eusspoyer a big knife that looked like a corn knife. Busaneyer stuck the knife down the front of his shirt end pants. Euseneyer was coaching the Flayboys ball toda. I left the yard and went to the greasy line and sie suppor. When I finished eating I went on up to the tunnel and was standing inside the turnel talking to Eaton. While I was there along came Dusmayer, Lows, Billy Burks, and two others that I did not know. They were at the front of the line. They went on down the tunnel and around the corner out of sight. The rest of the group started coming in and going down the tunnel. Most of them stayed along the left side of the tunnel in two lines. I beard screaming down at the corner of the tunnel and I looked down there and saw two gays with masks or hoods on their heads. They were cutting and stabbing at the colored fellows. I did not know any of the colored men. I say Eusempyer draw back and lungs at a colored boy and grab him and then he hit him with that big knife. It looked like he stuck him in the back. The colored wan would take a confidence.

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of steps and fall then get up and make a couple of more steps and fall. He was coming back toward the tunnel opening. Bussmeyer throwed the knife out of the window of the tunnel and ran around the corner toward the hobby shop. Bussmeyer was unmasked. I left the tunnel and went to B-20 where I celled with Sushank".

3. Ransey told the undersigned officer that on the following Saturday he was with a group of immates when Eussmeyer told them that he used the long knife and ran it clear through a colored man. Ransey further stated that he would testify in court but that he feared for his own life and if he had to testify, he did not want to stay in the "joint". He indicated he would like to transfer to Moberly.

1. On the morning of September 25, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Robert Charles Banks (00037. Banks is a negro male, age 24, whose howe is Slater, Missouri. He was admitted to the penitentiary January 12, 1960, to serve a term of fifteen years for second degree marder from Saline County. In 1958 he served a two year term in the Algos Intermediate Reformatory for stealing also from Saline County, Missouri. Banks has completed the eleventh grade and is able to read and write. This interview took place in the prison office of Major Folzy.

2. Early give the following secount of activities at the State Prison on the evening of June 8, 1964:

"About 6:40 or 6:45 p.m., Monday night, June 8, 1964, we were walking back up to the turnal opening at the control center. We were coming back from the recreation area. I saw Robby Burns setting on a keg pear the tunnel opening at the control center gate. was walking along the right side of the turned toward F and G Hall. Mitchell, Farks, and I was going to the hotby shop. I was on the right and Parks was about even with me on my left, and Mitchell was about four or five steps behind us. Simulas was going along the left side of the tunnel, about twenty or twenty-five feet behind us. About this time two white guys came from the direction of F and G Hall and rounded the corner facing us. They both hadwhite cloth hoods over their heads and faces. I did not know SERIALIZED. them. One had two holes for eyes and one had one hole. Both had brives and they vere yelling and clashing at innates, but I did not see them hit enyone. Invates were ruming every direction. Someone back toward the turnel opening yelled, 'I'm going to kill all of you'. I turned and looked back toward the opening. I say Farks grab his back and right side and I say Douglas backing every from Parks. We had a bloody builte in his right hand. I thought Parks was struck twice as he was holding his back with both hands. Parks stanted swinging. I ren between him and Billy Burke. Burke did not have a mach on but he had a knife that was long and looked like a butcher knife in his right hand. He drev the buile back and took three or four steps toward me and stopped. He looked surprised. Then a guy with a rag over his face grabbed

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me with his left hand and he drew back a knife with his right. I throwed up my hand and knocked the knife away. I also knocked his head and mask back and saw that his upper front teeth were missing. He was blond headed. I don't know this fellow's name, but I see him in the yard occasionally. Before I started running I saw Simmons. He hollered, 'Oh my lord', or 'Oh my god'. He was running toward the tunnel opening. Durke was alashing at Simmons' back with a bloody knife. I saw Chester Eley swinging a bloody knife but I did not see him cut anybody. He was over close to Simmons and Burke. Bley has a habit of wearing a hand-kerchief around his neck. He had it pulled up into a mask when I saw him with the knife. I knew him by his eyes and hair. Everybody took off running. I came back toward the tunnel opening and helped Mitchell through the central center gate and on to the hospital. I recognized Eley, Douglas, and Burke and could point out the fellow with no front teeth. I do not know who the other two fellows was".

3. Banks stated that the above information was true to the best of his know-ledge and that he would testify in court.

1. On the afternoon of September 24, 1964, the undersigned officer interviewed Jos Henry Brunner #08234, an immate of the Missouri State Prison. The interview was held in the prison office of Major Poiry. Brunner is a white male subject, age 28, from Sioux City, Iowa. He was sentenced to the Missouri State Prison on May, 1959, for a seven year term for turglary and larceny from St. Joseph, Missouri. He was sentenced again in 1964, two years, for escape from Cole Gounty, Missouri. He has other convictions as follows: in 1953 a one year sentence for burglary in the State of Oregon, in 1954 a three year sentence for burglary in the State of Texas, in 1957 a two year sentence for strong are robbery in the State of Oklahoma. Evanuar has a sixth grade education.

2. Erunner gave the following account of his activities and observances on the evening of June 8, 1966:

"At 6:35 p.m., June 8, 1964, Monday evening, we were moving through the twinel toward F and G Hall coming from the ball field. I was beek about mid-way of the group which was in two lines with a few walking in the middle. When I got around the corner, almost to the chapel door. I saw Chester Bloy drop out of the line and stand up egainst the rail. About that time he pulled a pillow case mask with holes for eyes down over his face. I think he took it cut of his shirt. He had a buife in his right hand and he yelled, 'Let's get these niggers'. Hothing started until he yelled. This colored boy had just passed Eley and he turned to run back toward the control center. As he got within reach, Ricy stuck him in the lower right part of his been about belt high. He missed him the second swipe and out his shirt. The colored boy ran on toward the corner and fall to the floor on his hands and knees. Eley tried to cut him again but the colored boy get away and ran toward the tunnel opening. Another colored man came running and screaming from F and G Hall down the tunnel toward the control tower and Eley took a swipe at him and missed. Eley had a knife about fourteen inches long with a slender blade. He throw the built into the shower room just off of the tunnel. About the same time I saw Bruke throw a smaller knife with blood on it in the shower room. I did not know either of the colored boys".

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
