and housed on our acute treatment unit. During the past year he has received several adverse behavior reports for refusing to move to designated area; fighting another patient, plus housed in maxium security units for control. He is ingratiating and manipulative in interviews and attempts to play different disciplines against others to achieve his needs being gratified. In May, 1966, he was observed sleeping outside the office after allegedly, in company of another patient, to have made a homicidal threat against the patient being interviewed. After he wrote a note to another patient indicating that he had a knife secreted in his shoe and he planned to use it on one of the staff members. A knife was found in his shoes as he indicated. In summary, Edmondson has required approximately 45 ward changes, 13 job assignments, and has required maxium security housing for approximately 20 months since his admission here in 1960. Historically he has shown evidence of depression and has made two suicide attempts. In 1963 electro shock therapy was initiated following self-mutilation attempt. MILITARY CLEMENCY RIVIEW

Edmondson, a 27-year old single-Megro male, continues to serve a 35-year sentence imposed by military court martial for murder. His adjusted release date with lost and extra good time is 4-17-81. Sentence excires full term on 12-11-92. There are no detainers on Alle

Edmandson continued in residence in the institution's Maximum Security Unit from 5-3-06 to 8-22-66, at which time he was transferred to a unit of relatively close structure, bri one from which he could leave daily in order to participate in institutional employment and other programs. During his residence in Maximum Security, he was reviewed on two occasions by the Psychiatriac Treatment Planning Council held on 3-15-67; recommendations-transfer to a unit of relatively less structure, work assignment as unit Orderly, continue residence on that unit until personnel determine his preparedness to transfer to a more open until and medication and referal to Maximum Security physician will be the primary responsibility of the physician on his unit of residence. Since his transfer to a moderately structured unit, the patient supervisor states that he is in fact, no problem to the unit. A positive behavioral difference was noted, and he has created no trouble among innates or officers. His attitude toward those with whom he comes in contact has been one of compensate tion. Edmondson functioned as ward Orderly until 6-27-67. His work supervisor state! 1 1111 he held duties of general sanitation and performed these duties well. He accepts response bility well although the opinion was presented that his compliance with authority was motivated only by necessity, not by willingness. An interest in self-improvement was indicated by his frequent studying in the unit. The education department states that he is presently enrolled in bookkeeping, Algebra I, and Economics. His intentions are apparently of self-improvement, and designed to improve occupational skills. Educadeon received his high school diploma from the Lake Shore High School in May, 1967, Beta IQ score is 🔀 On 6-27-67, he was assigned as typist to the Parola Record's Office, He has thus far functioned satisfactorily in that position. This is a job requiring skill as a competent typist and recorder. The volume of work is at times quite heavy, and Edmondson has handled this challenge well, displaying no evidence of stress. He has received approidmately four visits from family members since the time of his 1966 review. The Catholic Chaplin states that Edmondson has been attending services every Sunday. He has done considerable reading regarding the Catholic Church.

Since his release from Maximum Security, Edmondson has made definite attempts to involve himself in institution programs which would provide him educational and vocational development, as well as insight into numerous personality problems. There is no doubt, much manipulative behavior in evidence, however this behavior is directed toward positive goals. There has been no report of adverse behavior within the past year, and his known associate tions are not with a homosexual element. His contention is that he is becoming aware that his life will not be spent entirely in penal institutions, and the longer his behavior in adverse, there exists the possibility that his institution time may be extended. This present approach to institutionalization may sell reverse itself in the future through psychotic deterioration, however at this time, it is this writers impression that Edmond. son is raking a considerate effort for self-improvement vecationally, educationally, and through the acceptance, reluctant as it may be, that he does have psychiatric problems compounded by a great amount of time yet to be served.

AHNUAL HILITARY CLEMENCY REVIEW

Clifford Edmondson is a 26 year old Negro man who is serving a 35 year sentence for murder under GCHO #3 % #125. Fis life sentence was reduced on 3-17-64. His release date with good time to find the full term expires 12-11-92. He has no

One June 23, 1957, while Edmondson was stationed at Goose Air Bast, Labrador, he murdered a follow airman with a .55 calibration. Shortly after handomitted the crime he was soon by a psychiatrist in Labrador, who was of the opinion that he was psychotic and incompetent. His diagnosis was achizophrenic reaction, paramoid type. Tabor, ofter transfer, another psychiatrist diagnosed him as suffering from sovere behavior or character disorders and close to mild psychosis, and as competent. During the trial the first psychiatrist continued to consider Edmundson psychotic, but changed his thinking that he was then competent to stand trial.

Edmindson was transferred to Terre Haute on August 25, 1957. He was unable to adjust to the life there and was considered a disciplinary problem since May 1960. In August 1960 he was placed in administrative segregation, where he remained until September 10 when he was transferred to Leavenworth. At Leavenworth he was diagnosed as suffering from a schizophrenic rescuion, parenoid type, acutely disturbed, potentially dangerous, assaultive.

Ho was transferred to the Medical Center on Movember 23, 1960, as a certified psychotic pations. He was placed on the maximum treatment ward, and then one month later to the maximum control ward. From then until February 1962 he remained on either of these two wards most of the time. He was then transferred to an open ward and remained for four months. He was given a behavior report at this time because he was on a ward other than his own.

Hine months later he was transferred to an open ward. Dr.

Hilefaky, a psychiatrist, wrote this in a report after Edmundson had to be removed from the ward. "Pastent continues as schizophrenic reaction, schizoaffective type, much improved. Presently is mildly depressed following loss of his open ward status after a fight into which he was apparently provoked. Unfortunately his control was poor and he injured the other epsient rather badly. His last fight was about three years ago. Nevertheless response to treatment has been very good. Patient has domonstrated a greater depactby for trust, some evidence of conscience, and some espacity to acknowledge depression."

Nine months later he was again transferred to an open ward (12-26-63). The was assigned to industries on 4-9-64, and was able to maintain

that jeb for 82 months. His progress had been such that he was recommended for reduction of sentence which was granted (to 35 years).

On June 18, 1964, he was removed from certified psychotic status. In May 1964 he received his high school diploma as a result of much concerted effort.

On 3-31-64 he was transferred to the maximum treatment ward because he was becoming emotionally upuet and needed closer structure. He had received no behavior report at this time, but it was felt to be to his benefit to place him in a less threatening area. At first this was difficult for Edmondson to understand but during the ensuing months he has seen the advisability of the move.

Edmondson was placed in individual therapy with the writer, a psychiatric social worker, in February 1955. At first the hours were bi-weekly, but in the east four months weekly interviews have been maintained.

On March 12, 1965, Edmondson had again become depressed and it was necessary to place him on the minimum treatment ward. Great presautions are always taken when he begins showing suisidal tendencies, since he has almost successfully taken his life on ywo different occasions. On one occasion he jumped from the second story pier onto his head. Another time he slit his throat with a resor. He has been in a more open ward in the security unit since Nay 4, 1965. He was assigned to the industries: brush factory on that ward on July 23, 1965.

The ward personnel, including the doctor, recognize the progress this man has made and believe that this has come about through a change of attibude toward himself and others. His chart indicates that he is getting along well with both patients and staff. He has a sense of humor and a sense of fair play.

Through awareness of himself as a person and insight therapy this man has discontinued homosexual activities during the past of months. It is this writer's contention that this man's identity was the up with a new citically based conflict. The homosexual acting out was the symptom. The transference relationship with the writer, a woman, has also aided in this reworking of identification. It remains to be seen whether the separation from the writer, who is leaving soon, will affect this.

Edmondson's aggressive behavior of the past has been a defense against depression. This was sloc tied in with his feeling of manliness and that he was hiding the fact that he was a sensitive person. Through recognition with the therepist that it is alright to be this true self he has been able, at least for the present, to drop

this defense. One of the best signs of progress is Edmondson's ability to express his guilt and sorrow over his offense. He had thoughts in the past that if he took his life it would somehow even the score. He now is able to recognize that being his true creative self is the best solution. This is an intelligent man who does such intrespective thinking and weighing of ethical values. Another sign of progress is his ability to have a deep meaningful relationship with the writer.

Although there have been some emotional setbacks in the past 2's years we see a gradual upward trond in this can. Continued therapy is recommended.

REPORT OF NEUROPSICHIATRIC EXAMINATION

I. REASON FOR COMMITMENT: This 21-year old, single Negro male is serving a life sentence for premeditated murder of a fellow Air Force companion. Sentence began 12-12-57 at Leavenworth Barracks and the patient was transferred to Terro Haute on 8-25-59 because of intransigent inadaptability. Because of continuing aggressive and impulsively uncontrolled activity, the patient was transferred to Leavenworth on 9-10-60 where he displayed evidences of increasing psychic disorganization and was accordingly cortified as psychotic and transferred to the Modical Genter on 11-23-60 with a diagnosis of Schizophrenic meaction, Parenoid Type, Acute.

II. SOURCES OF INFORMATION: (a) The patient who is considered only partially reliable because of the confusion inherent in his coute psychotic episode as well as the underlying envieties the patient has conserving his intrapsychic functioning.

(b) Institutional records. (c) Questionnaires from his mother. (d) Transcripts of official military proceedings our rounding the instant offerse.

III. PARILY HISTORY: The patient's mother has led a turbulout life. It ago 17 she bad the illegitimate older brother to the patient. At age 19 she bore the petient who was also illegitimate. Six months later she married but was divorced within a year. She subsequently has had four husbands, the farst three of which were ussaccessful. The fourth husband, however, turned into a stable marital partner and there has been a stable home both contally and economically for the past tea years. During this time a helf-sister has been been to the marriage and the femily new lives in acceptably comfortable social economic circumstances. The social history of the mother reveals that she was an unstable, irresponsible, mervous woman who was a chronic alcoholic in her lato. Teen years. She acknowledges that the drank heavily and maintained a very unstable home for approximately ten years. Ouring the early years of the patient he was placed in several foster homes in succession and would frequently live with his grandmother for short periods of time. One of his earliest memories is being in an orphanage and the jamiter threatening to threw he and his brother in the furnace because they were misbahaving. Buring this period the children were removed from the mother she being declared an unfit parent. However when the patient was five the mother regained custody of the two hoys and they intermittently lived with the mother, the granimother and relatives. The patient's memory of his life up till age 10 is one of chaos, inscourity, anxiety, beloless ness, dependency and fructrated anger and unreceptive love. Records indicate that the patient and his brother would frequently keep the home together by working at odd jobs to provide for their came clothes and food. The patient recalls from a vivid memory of his mother standing naked in the kitchen while she was dead drunk throwing dishes out the window. Seeing such as this, the patient recalls with a good deal of anxiety, hostility and guilty love. Suffice to say that the patient's childhood until ago 10 was marked by lack of any father figure whatsoever and a very chaotic ambivalent mother figure whose relationship to the boy is most evidently traumatic. The records indicate that when the patient was 10 the mother quite suddenly reformed and deased her alcoholic pattern of living, settled down to a stable marital existence with her fourth husband and became deeply and devoutly roligious. She has continued this quite respectable adjustment throughout the ensuing ten years. However, it is apparent that the

groundwork for psychic distortion in the boy was already layed.

The patient and his older brother were constant companions throughout infancy and childhood. He states that he and his brother were always getting in fighte and that he could usually provoke his brother to become augry at him. However he recollections that he, the patient, would win the fights when he grew alder, his brother would win the fights. His sarliest childhood memory centers around an Easter egg hunt in which his brother found all the eggs and he found none. That there are deep cented hostile, competitive codipal strivings with the brother is manifest in much of the material. He mentions that his brother has at the present time twin illegitimate children but has not assumed any responsibilities and continues to live at home with the mother. Records indicate that the brother has a probable conjenital hip deformity and hence pertially crippled. He has not completed school and has been in minor difficulties. Records indicate also that the gatisat was often quite impulsively aggressive toward the older brother arring to stab him with a broken betale at age 5 and later with a dark and when lo, attempted to kill his brother with a broken bottle which the brother provented by everyowering the gations. Toward the younger half-eigter the patheat does not express his hostilities consciously but in some of his prior recorded psychotic letters there are many evident hestile allusions to the coroical position the young daughter maintains within the sholdered stoole household growlded for her which has and was dealed to the putions.

The patient furthermore in his psychotic material of his letters reveals implied ambivalent feelings toward his mather. He, at this time, consciously relates that he has both leve and hate for his mether and that he cannot desipher which of there feelings is the strongest and most important to him. He does however state that his mother hates him and that he feels this most assuredly especially since he heart has voice talking to him and telling him very bad things. As we approach these areas of his mother's attitude toward him and his reciprocal sactions, the patient becomes exceedingly tense, begins to display a good deal of sonfision and begins to act much more disorganized in his mental functioning. Hence so may assume that the patient's relationship to his brother is the area of probable gross psychopathology. This will be of importance in considering the trimgthe patient committed.

IV. PERSONAL HISTORY: Apparently the patient was been after a 32-hour labor and the mother states he was weak and sickly as a baby. He refused to eat any wing except wilk until six months old and then the mother would withhold wilk until he would willingly take any food offered to him. She notes that he was slow to talk because of stattering, even in infancy, and only began to walk at 1h months. We was noted as a shy, retiring, timid child who made friends very cloudy and touled to remain withdrawn within himself. Throughout childhood he had frequent attacks of asthon, virus infections and minor maladies which the mother cays he bord quit) well until he reached the "teen ago years at which time he began to become very consorned about his physical condition and become precompiled with his resurrent illnesses being very andows about the state of his health. It is noted that he disregarded the health of the rest of his family, however. The patient made steady progress in

school although he was frequently picked on by the larger boys and was often involved in fights and scraps. It is noted that he often seemed to taunt or tantalize people into anger toward him and that he himself was always known to be prone to impulsive outbursts of anger and acting out aggressive behavior. The patient seemed to resent discipline as a child and when punished would always retaliate. It was noted that when he would be elapped he would slap back and if this continued he would always get the last map in against his mother. She also noted that he would frequently taunt her to see how far he could push her before being severely punished. She notes that/she punished him only lightly he would continue to flourt her until she gave him a severe thrashing at which time he would then some to be properly chastoned and Ochave properly for awhile. Although the patient was pushed around by the Rore aggressive children, as he came to his theen ago years he begon to become the aggressive dominant person himself and by the time he entered high school was known to the school authorities as a rather aggressive juvenile. He was brought to the attention of javeaile authorities rather frequently over a period of ages 12 to 15 usually because of street juvenile gang octivities such as streetwelking, street fights, wholeving curfow and general insolonce. The peace officers report that the boy had a coultry chip on his shoulder abbitude and would not form any remort with authorities and mainkeined aloof resorve without apparent concorn. Finally at age 16 he was expelled from high school along with several other boys because of their intransigent belligorout attitude and constant potty misbehavior in the school. It was felt that their chronic, anticocial attitudes and behavior would seem involve them in comicus difficulties. The mother however notes that during this time of his early the and he was always very volite and coccerative at home and slways contributed to the welfare and care of the home and seemed to have a very protoctive concern for lor welfare and for the sustanance of the home functioning. He would help with the chores and volunteer for tasks requested of him and worked regularly at saveral odd jobs to contribute to his own support. It is also noted that the patient wan an extremely norvous child who was noted to wet the bed, be insormise, would often run away from home to his grandmother's but would quickly return on his own accord. Interestingly the patient claims that he had a nervous breakdown shortly after his mother remarked for the fourth time and that he had to be taken to a hospital. We might surmine that this "nervous breakdown" was an acute reaction of the boy to a competitor in the form of the new foster-father. Juvenila authorities report that the mother was always quito concerned about the bay but that the step-father was rather blace and diffident about the whole matter. The mother reports that there was constant friction in the home during all this time centering around rivalry between the two boys and also friction between them and the step-father.

Uson reaching his 17th birthday the patient enlisted in the Air Force with his parents' consent. We finished basic training without incident and went to Myoning for elerical training. While there he became involved in the instant offense with a training instructor whom he alleged hit him in the steach and physically abused him. They noted that he often acted rather bizerre and strange. He was noted to frequently forget things, to wander off his job or to perform tacks contrary to explicit instructions just given him. He claims several times that he would pass out when he was about to become involved in come assaultive behavior and was known as a mondy, impulsive, withdrawn, depressed individual. On the evening prior to the offense the patient was in a cauteen when an argument areas between him and another fallow concerning the pathont's denoing and playing his records too loudly in his room. The patient says he called the other men a liar who replied "your mother." The patient cays that he felt this was an insult and slur to his mother and his first impulse was to hit the man. Hewever, controlling himself, he decided that he would kill him. That might he obtained a pistol, a rifle and a knife and the following morning prospected to kill the man. However another soldier happened into the patient's way and he shot him instead. Stating that he had to get this fellow out of the way so he could kill the men he wanted to kill, he shooting the one coldler mercly because he was in his way. The pathent has given many different accounts of excetly hat happened although he has never proffered a reason so far as any records show. However he now states that he had a list of things for which he lived for and on this list was his girl friend and his mother. Showly before the offense his girl wrote him saying th t she was no longer going to continue corresponding with him. He states that when this fellow east appendions upon his mother that this removed the only other thing from his list worth living for and that he was ready to dis. He states that he has been wondering whether it was worth living for quite a while and that this ended it all. One may infer that the prtient reacted to violently to the elleged inpult to his mother because it pin-pointed the fact that he had infeed messive hostile engressive impulses toward his own mother which he could not consciously accept and honce there was a strong need for him to kill the men who had expressed his own unacceptable conscious desires of death toward his own mother. It is noteworthy that the patient had propared a list of eight follow officers and soldiers whom he was going to kill because they had been making imsults and alighting remarks conserving him. They am innocent bystander was killed rather than the real. offender is not particularly surprising in view of the fact that the patient's hestilities were actually an expression of his own self-anger which he account to express against composit olse since he could not empress them against himself and we see indeed thet he had been battling with his own suicidal wishes for some time prior to the murder he committed. Hence we can see the actual murder as being an alternative to his one suicide and he ame in fact making a suicide gesture since murder would mean that he would be emecuted.

The patient was brought to the U. S. fer trial and after the adjudication of the court and contending he was incorporated at Leavenworth Barracks and has been in the various Federal institutions since.

V. PHISICAL & TUROLOGICAL EXAMINATION:

The patient has a negative physical history except for complaints of failing eyesight and the patient has a recorded loss of visual acuity 20/1000S and 20/70 00 which he claims has only commenced since incarceration. VI. PRESENT ILLNESS: is has been noted, the pathent had a very traumatic childhood with a very pathological mother figure and no father figure. We see early in life the socks of personality formation beginning to form. Early in life he is noted to have been aggressive and impulsive with very poor control of his aggressive hostile impulses. Furthermore there is a very embivalent nother figure who is the only source of support and yet is a repelling, rejecting, despicable figure the is dergelf dependent on her sons. Hovertholess she is the mother and must be leved despite her unlowableness. To add to this the methor is openly provocative to the boys in a sexual manner qual as is esen in the patient's mother standing nahed. It is not surprising then that we find very intense rivalry between the patient out his older brother with attempts to Hill the brother populatedly noted in the parient's history. Nor is it burprining now to note the unconscious hostility toward the younger half-sister who occupies the position that the potient so covets and yet cannot here. We note that the patient is a sickly baby which devoloped chemit and has many neurotic mannerisms during infancy and early childhood with many payehosometic complaints and that when the 'teen ago years come hore is a boy who becomes hypochendrically in his solf-consorm. Furthermore we note a shy, diffiders, timil individual was has difficulty making friends and is bullion by other prople. Leter again as he excepted into adolescence to find the timidity being compensated for by open aggressivences. Of note is the fact that the mother writes that the patient had many girl friends with whom he would very easily and deeply fall in love. He would give them expensive processo and would often give them every cont that he had in his poshet and would be exterbitant in levishing gifts upon them. The court chains the girls very often had very little affection for him but that he would seem to almost knock bimself out in arging to demonstrate his everyweeding love for the girl friend. A rether obvious displacement of effection on to the girls as the mother figure would come to be appropos here. As noted, we see a boy who has dever had any satisfactory models from which to learn ego control and as a matter of fact tee rather extly copical the alcoholie uncontrollable ego of the tofantile mother which is a bedemistic ego. Therefore up are not surprised to find him demonstrating antisonial behavior during his from age yours nor are we surprised to find that he demonstrates very poor ego control of his hostile and aggressive impulses while in the service and the development of feelings of suspicion, persocution and hostility from other people with a projection on to other people of his own mostility toward them. The dynamics of his behavior resulting in the murder have been elucidated.

Following the murder the patient was seen by a paychiatrist in Labrador who made a diagnosis of Schizophrenie Poschion, Paranoid Type, Chronic, Jevere and was of the opinion that the patient was payehotic and incorpotent. Accordingly the patient was transferred to the States and while encounts was very disturbed, compared and apparently disturbed although full records are not available. However, the patient finally arrived at Shephard Air Perce Base where further payehistric exemination was performed by a second psychiatrict the felt that the patient represented an extracely severe behavior or character disorder who was close to mild psychiatric the patient was severely ill but probably competent. The only other opinion was rendered by a physician who saw the patient just after the time of offense for a brief period of time and thought that he represented a parancid schizophronie as well as a major character disorder. Following the trial in which it was concluded that the potient was mentally accretion; and know wish's Capm wrong, no was sentenced to life, the said escaped bring reviewed and escapted by the recently or island, upon admission to leavenworth introcks the catient presented a ploture of insature, childish behavior with an inability to remain on one job for any length of time, requiring close supervision and unable to refrain from juvanile nuisance behavior. His ethicude veried from poor to very good depending upon the perticular supervicors or the job. He received a number of behavior reports for fighting, insolence and disobedience which finally resulted in his transfer to force House after the payablaction of Leavenworth Barrocks felt that the pattern reprogented a case of emotionally immedia personality disorger which is to say a semispath who is emobionally immature. Upon arrival at Terme Haute the pations continued his former balligurant chip on the shoulder attitude provoking other people to fights, frequently being involved in impulsive aggreesive belavior which was very remeniscent often of his bonewior at the time of the wurder. The psychiatrist at Terro Haute moted that the patient was seclusive and tended to conceal his thoughts and was not too comperably with poyeblatric examination. Because of his continued adverse behavior the publicut was transferred to Leavonnorth whore shortly after addation he has noted to be mondy, depressed, expressing suicidal thoughts and was transferred to the psychiatric unit for closer observation. There he became progressively more discreasined, began to bave auditory and visual ballucinations, became grosaly a sorganised and did not respond to acute tranquilising thorapy. He was accordingly contilled as paychotic with a diagnosic of Schlsophronic Reaction, Agute Farancid Type and was transferred to the Medical Center. Upon arrival at the Medical Center the patient was placed in the soute treatment ward whore he repidly reorganised himself although there were evidences that he had continuing auditory hallucinations. The patient remained withdrawn and sectionive without revealing much of his thought content to the different psychiatrists. He has since that time progressed slowly through three of the maximum security uplies to the most liberal regime available under maximum supermision. Only new has he began to demonstrate some of the more juvenile, immature demanding aggressive behavior that has been recorded in the past since up to this time he been very passive, quiet, withdrawa and obsequious in his behavior.

As the procent time the patient voices much material which is obviously psychotic is nature and he continues to have auditory hallucinations which he dealer. We would consider this man actively and still acutely psychotic coffering from a paramoid type of echisophrenic reaction. More important than the patient's actual mental status at this time, however, is the longitudinal picture of this man's illness cines it becomes apparent at this time that what has superficiently on the surface apparent to be a sociopathic type of perconality has in actuality been a longer term chronic paramoid schizophrenic spaction which was perhaps in a more incidious state in earlier

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years and we see now blossoming the more overtant obtious manifestations of his offense. It is a rather most point as to whether he was competent at the time of his offense or at the time of trial since the patient received several psychiatric examinations. It would seem from this vantage point that the patient has been rather obviously a chronic parenoid schizophrenic for most of his life but to what extent it actually interfered with his competency and responsibility is something that cannot be determined at this time and from what we see of the patient it would appear that any such determination must be made at the moment such as was indeed actually done at the time of trial quite adequately.

will. MENTAL STATUS: The patient has been seen by this examiner covered times as ward doeser and in interview sessions as well as the administration of paychological materials. The patient is a well, muscular legro make in excellent physical condition with a slight obesity because of tranquillaing regime. The hallucinations center around (1) his mother's denial of him, (2) the accumancy hestile feelings of the will—nesses at his trial and (3) the angulated order of the min he aurebrad.

The patient's intellectual functioning demonstrates an excellent memory for recent and remote events although this is frequently conteminated by his our conscious suppression of very psychically conflicting and destructive meterial such as his memories of the distorted pathological figure of his mother when he alternately layed and bates. At the present time he is able to bring things into memory only after the examiner gives him appoint and the patient is able to appreach threstening material via obscuratantial evenues. His store of knowledge is commensurate with a WAS ID of 106 and he demonstrates an acceptable store of knowledge compatible with about the eighth grade edge-thom. His range and type of ideas are markedly constricted.

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He completely dismisses anything that has bappened prior to his incarceration, feeling that he has never lived before thistime and there are repeated evidences of conscious impoverishment of his thought material. He is constantly presecupied with the hallucinatory voices which speak to him and the observious to has conversing his own hostility and aggression. The patient does not confabulate at this time nor does no present any delusionary material although he certainly feels at times persecuted and maligned by authority.

thought pattern although chiefly there is noted the psychomotor retardation, the very frequent and ety provoked blocking and the marked ever-symbolization and over-determined responses that he presents. In general the patient's intellectual functioning is well preserved and does not show the gross and obvious distortions of schizophrenic distorganization but are rather the distortions of interpersonal purseption and intrapers nal acceptance such as we see in the paramoid type of schizophrenic restident

His emotional responses are retarded and inappropriate at times with burnts of laughter and flights of thought with alternating periods of Mosping, self-depropation and at other times bestility, suspiciousness, withdrawd and apprehensiveness.

In his relationship to other people he reveals mithdravel, heatility, suspiciousness, inability to form resport with projection of his our feelings on to other people
leading to feelings of persocution and heatility. The patient feels that he was being
made into a homosemual at Leavenworth and voices many strong feelings of persocution
in regards to racial projection. He denies may prior heatscaual experiences or cetivity
which one might expect in the scute psychotic state which he is in. Contractions
we would expect that he would possibly be more homosemual were he to become recomstituted again.

The patient has a good deal of current englety in part engendered by his native hallusinatory experiences as well as his limited ability to control aggreealen or relate successfully to other people. The patient has used flight or flight mechanisms to deal with unconfertable situations and no see his current flight into illness as a way of escepting from expressing hostility too openly toward other people. The patient is embly torn in his acceptance toward his illness expressing at times a demine to be helped and at other times fearful of the implications of mental illness.

The patient's reclity contact at the present time is very tenuous indeed. He is cought up ishio our ambivalency toward his mether, his arbivalency toward authority, his inability to devolop an adequate psychosenual identification and he is leaded down with massive guilt feelings which he has contexing around his aggression beward his mether. This leaves either one of two cituations; wither he internalises the guilt and aggression upon himself which produces more psychotic disorganisation or else he organises himself more efficiently and expresses his heatility externally toward his environment. Tither one of these colutions which he uses is colfeduative tive and hases the patient is caught in a perpotuating triangle of affairs. The patient

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is presently better organised than at the time of his initial acute disorganization at Leavenworth but he continues to maintain personality organization only at the expense of great psychic effort and very limited internal economy.

VIII. FURMULATION: This is a 21-year old, single Negro male doing life for promeditated murder. He was the second illegitimate son born to a woman who was irresponsible and alcoholic for approximately ten years of the patient's life producing a very chaotic and hostic home life for the patient. The incipient saeds of a paramoid schizophronic personality are repeatedly documented from carliest childhood. The chief psychopathology is centered around the pathent's our ambivalence toward the mother figure which culminated in the instant offense which was murder of another soldier. Psychically this represents an expression of the hostility which he had toward his mother being expressed for him by another individual. Since this ownessed the patient's com hostility he murdered as an expression of his hostility rather than committing suicide. Following the patient's incarecration he has demonstrated juvenile immaturity, belligerout attitude, withdrawel, sockedive mien and progressive parchic disorganisation until he at lost became greenly psychotic. The patient at the present time makes only a tenuous contact with reality and is striving hard to maintain a marginal personality integration.

As formulated above, our theregentic aims must be simed as breaking the perpetuating circle of guilt induced aggrassion toward either binculf or his environment. This would include developing some rapport with the patient or that he can form acceptable relationship with a parental curregate honce resolving some of the intense ambivalency which he feels at the present that Further therapeutic efforts might be bont toward developing some accortance of the mother which the petient continued to have large amounts of hostility toward. Were this to happen we sould anellorate some of the internalised aggression and hence increase permenality erganization and a larger degree of self-acceptance. Maving accomplished this goal it would then be possible to start a program of ago strengthoning of his externally directed aggression toward authority and parental symbols. This means that the patient is going to good long term supportive and later interpretive therapy which he sooms to have the intelleguel equipment to handle. First efforts must be directed toward amoliaceting his more paychotic machanisms of defense and shoring up his masger ago resources. It is anticipated that the patient will require well defined limits for some time antil his ego develops more adequately.

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by reason of physical disability; that the diagnosis in his case was "Schizophrenic reaction paranoid type, chronic, severe, VA Code 9203, rated at 100%"; that the disability was permanent, and that the date he became unfit was about June 1957.

He was tried and convicted by a General Court-Martial on 12/12/57, for on or about 6/23/57, did at Goose Air Force Base, Labrador, with premeditation, murder another Airman by means of shooting him with a .45 caliber pistol. He was sentenced dishonorably discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and confinement at hard labor for the term of his natural life. However, by General Court-Martial Order Number 38, dated 10/10/67, pursuant to the direction of the Secretary of the Air Force, the findings of guilty and the sentence in the general court-martial case of KDMONDSON, were set aside. Also, all rights, privileges, and property of which EDMONDSON had been deprived by virtue of the findings of guilty and sentence were restored. He was released from confinement at the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri.

Special Progress Report of the U. S. Medical Center, Springfield, Mo., revealed the following diagnosis for EDMONDSON: "Schizophrenic Reaction, Paranoid Type, Chronic, with acute exacerbation as characterized by an individual with a life history which demonstrates the incipient seeds of a schizophrenic type personality with the evidence of mounting paranoid type of reaction throughout the years culminating in a gross psychotic disorganization at this time with only partial amalieration seen currently." The records further indicated that MDMONDSON had made two suicide attempts and that in 1963 electro shock therapy was initiated following self-mutilation attempt.



On July 10, 1969 I interviewed James Jackson in sommettion with an unrelated investigation concerning Jackson's alleged associations with James Boyd and other St Louis area boodluss.

Following this interview Jackson stated that several months age three persons came to his shop in a group and purchased firearms and assumition. This group visited the shop on several occasions and each time parked their car out of the shop area. On April 7, 1968 they were using the brown Cafillac, and on April 13, 1968 the blue Cadillac, as described above. Members of the group gave names and addresses as shown on the attached JJJ invoices. Jackson stated he does not believe the names as shown on the invoices are correct.

During the course of one of the visits, a member of the party stated, "We sure took care of Martin Lather," or words to that effect. He immediately corrected himself and stated, "I meant they took care of him". Following this visit, Jackson stated he found some publications of the Minutenan Organization at his store and a soumed the publications were left by one of the party.

On July 11, 1968, Special Scent George Armst, FEI, Kansas City, Missouri was advised of this activity because of the references to Martin Luther King.

BEVERLY LAWSON, 1545-B Leeshores Lane, advised that she is the manager of the Highland House Apartments and that unit 1514-B Leeshores Lane is occupied by one MARTHA FORNKCHL, nickname MARTY, and ANELL CARTER. She advised they have lived in the apartment since July 1, 1968, and she believes that both of them may be prostitutes in view of the fact that they are living with four unidentified males, and there have been complaints of a "steady succession" of male visitors at all hours of the day and night. She further advised she is attempting to have the girls evicted because of their activities.

MARTHA FORNKOHL, 1514-B Leeshores Lane, St. Louis County, Missouri, nickname MARTY, advised she first met JERRY RAY at about the second week of June, 1968 in the Cherokee Buffett which she described as a tavern located in the 1900 block of Cherokee, St. Louis, Missouri. She stated that at the time she was with friends there and JERRY was introduced to her and attempted to sell her a German Shepherd puppy. She further advised that she subsequently saw RAY on two or three occasions at the Grapevine, a bar on Arsenal Street, St. Louis, Missouri. However, she never dated him. The last time she saw JERRY RAY was on July 5, 1968 when RAY drove her home in the early morning hours, from the Grapevine, after a July 4 party. She advised she has not seen him since nor has she heard from him, although she had heard through friends that JERRY RAY had left town shortly after the July 5.





DONALD JAMES NISSEN, FBI Number 607 320 A, was a parole violator in case in which Phoenix was origin. He had previously made telephonic contact with SA G. WAYNE MACK of the Phoenix Office and made arrangements to surrender himself to agent MACK at St. Louis on August 5, 1968.

On the morning of August 5, 1968, NISSEN called the St. Louis Office from the Municipal Airport at St. Louis stating he had just arrived by plane from Tampa, Florida, and desired to surrender to the FBI. He was subsequently taken in custody by SA CLETIS B. BIDEWELL and SA G. WAYNE MACK and upon interview furnished the following information:

NISSEN has remarried and his wife, who is pregnant, is living and working in Tampa, Florida. NISSEN has been working as a salesman for a book company which he declined to name and stated he has been doing very well financially. Until around the first of December NISSEN was living and working in the Atlanta, Georgia, area. Around the first or second of December, 1967, as he was leaving the Federal Building in Atlanta after having made his regular contact with his probation officer, he was hailed on the steps of the Federal Building by an individual, unknown to him. This person asked if he was DON NISSEN and when he replied in the affirmative, this individual stated he had a message for him from MAC. NISSEN understood MAC to be LEROY MC MENAMAN, who had advised him while they were fellow inmates at Leavenworth Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, that \$100,000 had been offered by the White Knights of the Ku Kl Klan of Mississippi to be paid to anyone who would kill MARTIN LUTHER KING.

The person accosting NISSEN on the steps of the Atlanta Federal Building then stated that apparently somebody had done some talking and NISSEN assumed he made reference to information that he had furnished to the FBI in Sherman, Texas, in April, 1967. Before any more conversation transpired, the individual who had transported NISSEN to the Federal Building called to him from across the street and the unknown individual immediatel walked away from him. It was NISSEN's assumption that this person thought the individual calling him might be an FBI agent or police officer and did not desire that his identity be learned.
