SUMMARY REPORT DICTATED BY LAPD OFFICERS. REPORTED AND TRANSCRIBED BY SHARON THIELMAN, CSR, ON JUNE 28, 1968.

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Grier indicated on the night of the shooting, prior to the Senator's speech, he was with him in his suite on the Fifth Floor of the Ambassador Hotel. When it came time for the speech, the Senator, Grier and others left the room and took a freight elevator to the kitchen area adjacent to the Embassy Room. They entered the room via the kitchen and again Grier, along with the Senator, was on the stage with other members of the Senator's campaign. At the conclusion of the speech, the Senator exited the stage by a rear door. Grier recalled that he assisted the Senator's wife, Ethel Kennedy, in getting down from the stage. He walked with her on her right side. After leaving the stage, they entered a foyer area between the kitchen and the Embassy Room. Grier recalled this area was quite crowded with people and television men carrying cameras.

At the time of the shooting, he approximated that

he was about two paces (six to eight feet) from the double

but was not sure of the number or sequence. He immediately

doors leading into the kitchen. He recalled hearing the shots

began moving forward and recalled having to cut across the room to get by and over people to get to the area where the Senator was. He indicated there were a group of men struggling with the suspect and that he broke into this group and placed his hand on the gun which the suspect was still in possession He wrenched the gun from the suspect's hand after an episode wherein the suspect lost control of the gun, at which time it was lying on the table, and then (the suspect) regained control of the gun. After wrenching the gun from the suspect's hand, he turned it over to Rafer Johnson who had arrived during the struggle and was also assisting in the disarming of the suspect. He did not see the suspect prior to or during the shooting nor did he see the Senator fall. After turning the gun over to Johnson, Grier maintained a physical control of the suspect along with others until the arrival of the police at which time the suspect was transferred to their custody.

Roosevelt called the police department and talked to a sergeant who gave him permission to fly to New York. I don't know when he will return or where he will be staying in New York City."

Bill Barry, the Senator, Mrs. Kennedy and I were walking away from the stage when I heard several shots. I looked up and saw a man holding a gun in his hand, I think the gun was in his right hand. I didn't see anyone fall as a result of a gunshot. I went to where the man with the gun was standing and helped some other men subdue him. He was still holding the gun so I twisted it out of his hand.. I later gave the gun to Rayford Johnson. I saw two men lying on the floor, one of them was Senator Kennedy, he was bleeding from the head.

I did not like see anyone else, and I didn't see any smoke or anything like that, but I did see the man with a gun and heard the sound and saw the struggling and I froze after I -- you know, got my senses back together again, then I moved toward -- you know, everything -- I saw the Senator -- the first couple of sounds which I looked up, I did see the Senator throw-you know-throw up his hands. Uh, then the next thing I can remember is seeing the Senator on the ground and standing up, you know, on his feet and being pushed around. All right, going back a moment, when you looked

Mr. Griffin was interviewed at the Los Angeles Office of the Negro

Industrial and Educational Union at 8421 S. Vermont on 6-7-68 at

11:30 a.m. (Mr. Griffin is the Los Angeles director of the organization.)

He states: "THAT he has known Senator Kennedy for about 10 or 11 years

and also that he was active in the Senators' California campaing.

On Tuesday evening, 6-4-68, at about 10:15 p.m., Mr. Griffin arrived

at the Ambassador Hotel for the election returns. He did not have a

Press Pass or other pass to get into the Embassy Room, so he went

downstairs to the Ambassador Room which was apparently open to the

public.

While Mr. Griffin was in the Ambassador Room, he states that he observed two people whom he thought seemed out of place. He states that there was a male whom he describes as:

MALE, of some descent similar to Mexican; short, 5-4, or less; small build and shabbily dressed in old clothes: Mr. Griffin says that he is positive that this man he saw is the suspect in the Kennedy shooting; Sirhan SIRHAN, and he ID the suspect from a picture the I/O showed him. Mr. Griffin describes the other person, a

FEMALE, Cauc - or "OF NORDIC DESCENT", 5-5/6", (taller than the male), with hair of unknown color, but arranged up on her head in a fluffy manner, and wearing a dress that was predominately white, but that may have had other color in it. Mr.Griffin stated the reason he thought the two people seemed out of place was because everyone else but these two ere celebrating the apparent Kennedy victory. Mr. Griffin

was standing about 8 to 10 feet from the two people but did not hear any conversation between them but stated that he had what he describes as "negative eye contact" WITH THEMALE.

After spending about 15 to 20 minutes downstairs in the Ambassador Room, I was able to obtain a press pass to go into the Embassy Room. After Mr. Griffin had been in the Embassay Room for an hour or so, he observed the same two people that he had seen in the Embassay Rom, and this time there was another male with them. He described him as:

Male, with lighter complexion than the other man, tall (6-o/6-2), NFD.

The three were standing in the kitchen corridor next to the doorway that leads through the kitchen and out into a parking area. This was about 30 to 45 minutes before Senator Kennedy's arrival.

Just prior to the conclusion of Senator Kennedy's speech; Mr. Griffin passed through the kitchen corridor and went into the Press Room; he heard the first shots being fired. His position in the doorway of the Press Room gave him a clear view of the whole corridor. Almost simultaneously, he observed Senator Kennedy throw one of his arms over his face, and the female and the taller unidentified male run out of the doorway. He then observed some people struggling with the other male who still had the gun in his hand. When Mr. Griffin saw the two people

MR. GRIFFIN recalls that just prior to the shooting, he mentioned to a friend (whom he does not want to Identify), that "there's a guy I've been seeing all evening and for some reason we don't seem to take to each other". He was referring to the suspect he identified as SIRHAN SIRHAN.

Interview conducted July 2, 1968, 6:30 p.m. at above residence address Richard Grijalva arrived at the San Gabriel Valley Gun Club, 4001 Fish Canyon Road, Duarte June 4, 1968, 12 noon. Grijalva was accompanied by his sister, Miss Roberta Grijalva (See interview I-1082) Grijalva upon arriving at the gun club went to the control tower to get a target. Grijalva received his target and was starting to the rifle range when he observed a man at position #20 or 21 on the pistol range rapid firing. Grijalva describes the man as a male, foreign descent, 20-22, thin build, 5'2"/3", dark brown hair combed back neat, wearing light blue pants, blue sweater, and dark sunglasses. Grijalva stopped to watch the man fire because the man was rapid firing which is unusual on the range. Grijalva then went to the rifle range where he placed his own target and fired his guns 30/30, 243, 30/06 and a .22 rifle. Grijalva returned to the control tower in approximately twenty minutes from the time he received his first target to get a new target, Grijalva again saw the aforementioned man at positions 20 or 21 on the pistol range still rapid firing. Grijalva states the man was the only person on the pistol range, that he was firing a possible .22 caliber revolver, four inch, due to the small frame and the sound of the gun. Grijalva saw two large cartons of ammo on the bench in front of the man, each carton containing ten small boxes of fifty each, possible Remington brand. Grijalva did not observe what the man was doing with the shell casings. Grijalva returned to the rifle range position 36. Grijalva states the man had one large box of ammo with him which contained ten small boxes of 50 each. Grijalva states the aforementioned man came to the rifle range about 2:30 p.m. He took position 30 or 32 where he fired a .22 rifle, bolt action, equipped with a scope. Grijalva left the range at approximately 3 p.m. and states the man was still on the rifle range firing. Grijalva states the FBI has talked to him. Grijalva identified the mug shot of Sirhan out of four look alkes as the man he mentioned above being at the gun club

Richard GRIJALVA arrived at the San Gabriel Valley Gun Club, 4001 Fish Canyon Rd., Duarte, 6-4-68 at 12 noon. GRIJALVA was accompanied by his sister Miss Roberta GRIJALVA (See-Interview I-1082). GRIJALVA, upon arriving at the Gun Club went to the Control Tower to get a target, GRIJALVA received his target and was starting to the rifle range when he observed a man at position #20 or #21 on the pistol range who was rapid firing. GRIJALVA describes the man as a male; foreign descent; 20-22; thin build; 5-2/3; dark brown hair combed back neat; wearing light blue pants, blue sweater & dark sun glasses. GRIJALVA stopped to watch the man fire because the man was rapid firing which is unusual on the range. GRIJALVA then went to the rifle range where he placed his own target and fired his guns 30/30, 243, 30/06, and a 22 rifle. returned to the Control Tower in approx. 20 minutes from the time he received his first target to get a new target, GRIJALVA again saw the aforementioned man at position #20 or #21 on the pistol range rapid firing. GRIJALVA states the man was the only person on the pistol range that he was firing a possible 22 cal. revolver 4 inch due to the small frame and the sound of the gun.

GRIJALVA saw two large cartons of ammo on the bench in front of the man. Each large carton containing 10 small boxes of 50 each. Poss. Remington brand. GRIJALVA did not observe what the man was doing with the shell casings. GRIJALVA returned to the rifle range position #36. GRIJALVA stated the aforementioned man came to the rifle range about 2:30 PM, he took position #30 or #32 where he fired a 22 rifle bolt-action equipped with a scope. He states the man had one large box of ammo with him which contained 10 small boxes of 50 each. GRIJALVA left the range at approx. 3 PM and states the man was still on the rifle range firing. He states the FBI has talked to him. GRIJALVA ID the mug shot of Sirhan out of 4 look alikes, as the man he mentioned above being at the gun club on 6-4-68.

Grijalva states she was watching her brother fire his rifles on the rifle range at approximately position 38. She heard rapid firing coming from the pistol range but did not go to the pistol range or see who was doing the rapid firing. Grijalva identified the mug shot of Sirhan from four look alikes as the person she saw at the qun club rifle range, June 4, 1968. Grijalva states Sirhan Sirhan came to the rifle range approximately 2:45 p.m., took position 34 and was firing a .22 automatic rifle and had three boxes of ammo in a red, blue, and white box with a big "X" printed on the outside. Grijalva describes Sirhan as a male, foreign descent, 22-23, 5'12", thin build, dark pants, dark blue sweater cardigan, dark sunglasses. Grijalva states there were three other people on the rifle range at about position 36. #1, male Caucasian, 30, 5'8", medium build. #2, female Caucasian, 25, blond, dark capris and light-colored blouse. #3, male Caucasian, 21, 5'10", thin build, blond hair, dark pants and cowboy boots. Grijalva left approximately 3 p.m. Sirhan was still firing. FBI Agents Bagley and Laner interviewed Grijalva. Grijalva did not see anyone with or talking to Sirhan.



Witness was on stage with Senator during the speech. After the speech, Witness was preceeding the Senator through the pantry with George Plimpton I-1020. He looked back and observed the Senator shake hands with some people and then start to walk away. At that time Witness heard 5 shots in rapid succession. He saw Sirhan standing about 7'-8' to the left front of the Senator. His arm was fully extended and he was firing a There was a look of tremendous concentration on his face. saw the Senator falling to the floor and someone catching him.

Witness recalled George Plimpton rushing to the suspect & going for the Rosie Grier "slammed" Sirhan into a table, according to Witness.

Witness was walking toward the Colonial Room, preceeding Senator Kennedy, in the area of the West end of the ice machines. He had turned and was walking backwards, looking at the Senator. He described the Senator standing with his body facing in an Easterly direction and his head turned to his left in a Wortherly direction. His right arm was across his body and he was shaking hands. He was standing approximately 2' South of the South end of the first steam table and approximately 4' West of the West edge of the table. The suspect was standing approximately 4' to 6' from the Senator, near the center of the same table. His right foot was forward and his right arm was extended with the gun in his right hand. Witness estimated the gun was about 2' from the Senator. indicated he could be off on the distances due to the circumstances.

He heard the shots and it was then that he first saw the suspect in the above described position. However, he did not see the flashes from the gun nor the Senator being hit. His view of the suspect's face was a left profile. He described the suspect as having a look of determined concentration on his face. He next saw the Senator with his right hand up in the air.

In reviewing the moment of the incident, witness recalled that he froze. His next recollection was that of Rosie Grier rushing toward the suspect. He was informed that there was about a twenty second period between the shooting and Grier arriving. He replied that he did not recall what happened during that period.

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Mr. PETE HAMILL was interviewed at his temporary residence, 196 Berkeley Place, Brooklyn, New York, telephone number 638-8215. He stated that he will be moving within a week to 479 14th Street, Brooklyn. New York.

He is a free lance writer and on June 4-5, 1969, while living in California, he covered the Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY company.

During the evening of June 4, 1966, prior to Denator KENDEDY making his victory speach, HAMILL was in solutor KENNEDY's suite in the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, california, with Senator KENNEDY and JIMMY BRESLIN, the writer. HAMILL went to the elevator with Senator KENNEDY when Senator KENNEDY was on his way to make his victory speech.

There was confusion at the elevators and HAMILL did not get on the same elevator with Elevator HENNEDY.

During Senator KERMEDY's speech, HAMILL stood on the podium to Senator KENNEDY's rear and left. This was near the left rear corner of the podium near some drapes and some stairs that went down. Standing near HAMILL were GEORGE PLIMPTON, the writer, and PLIMPTON's wife, FREDDY. Standing near the stairs was BILL BARRY of Senator KENNEDY's staff.

During the speech "a guy" or a "kid" tried to get on the polium by coming through the drapes which were in book of HAMILL. Bill BARRY noticed this individual and told him to get out. HAMILL would not recognize this individual if he saw him again.

When Senator KENNEDY finished his speech, HAMILL or PLIMPTON asked BILL PARRY which way to go out.

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HAMILL and BARRY pointed to a corridor to the pantry. PLIMPION went out that way which was down the nearby stairs and HAMILL did not see Senator KWWNEDY leave the podium. HAMILI next saw Senator KENDEDY in the pentry. HAMILL was walking along with GEORGE PLIMPTON in front of Senator KENNEDY and to his (Senator KENNEDY's) right about ten feet. HAMILL did not know that Senator KENNEUT was going to the press room but thought Senator KENNEDY Was headed from "The Factory", where a party was to be As HAMILL was walking along and looking back, he saw Senator KENNEDY turn to his left to shake hands with someone. After Senator KENNEDY shook hands with this individual, he (Schator KENNEDY) turned to continue walking straight ahead. At this time what HAMILL thought were five (5) shots were fired in very rapid succession. HAMILL looked and saw SIRHAN SIRHAN who was standing in front of and to Senator KENNEDY's left about seven (7) or eight (8) feet with his (SIRHAN's) arm fully extended and his face in tremendous concentration, shooting a gun at Senator KENNEDY. Senator KENNEDY was falling to the floor and someone caught Senator KENNEDY.

ROSIE GRIER ran by HAMILL and "slammed" SIRHAN into a table. GEORGE PLIMPTON rushed over to SIRHAN and want for the gun. RAFER JOHISON came out of somewhere and HAMILL thinks that JOHNSON got the gun. SIRHAN was "thrown thinks that JOHNSON got the gun. SIRHAN was "thrown up on a table" or group of tables and "slid down to the end of the table" or tables.

There was much yelling and noise and HAMILL was momentarily "stupified". He then looked at his watch. It was 12:12 A.M., June 5, 1968. HAMILL heard people saying such things to SIKHAN as "Why did you do it?" HAMILL did not hear SIRHAN say anything.

HAMTLL stated that he did not see or notice SIRHAN before the shooting. HAMILL did not touch SIRHAN.

Immediately after the shooting, HEALY jumped up on the metal tables and ran to the other end. He was aware of nothing going on as he ran up the tables. When he reached the edge of the last table, he looked down and saw the Sen. Lying on the floor. It was then that he became aware of a struggle taking place by his left foot. He looked down and saw a group of men struggling with the susp. He didn't recall who any of the men were, except Rosie Grier. He recalled that he was amazed at the difficulty Grier had getting the gun away from such a small man. HEALY wrote an eye-witness account of the incident for his paper. He agreed

ROBERT HEALY, Boston Clobe, Boston, Massachusetts, advised he represented his paper in the coverage of Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY's campaign in the California primary election.

HEALY stated he did not know the reason why Senator KENNEDY changed his plant according his going to the Ambassador Room after his speech following the June 4th primary.

HEALY stated he observed SIRHAN B. SIRHAN when he was seized immediately after the shooting. He stated he had never seen SIRHAN on any previous occasion.

HEALY stated that earlier on that evening, he observed an individual who resembled SIRHAN but who definitely was not SIRHAN. HEALY stated he met this individual just after Senator KENNEDY began his talk in which he thanked his workers and the voters for the victory.

HEALY stated that he could not hear the speech very well and entered the Colonial Room so he could watch it on TV. He stated the room contained about 12 working press and TV men. HEALY stated that there were two security men at the door of the Colonial Room checking press credentials.

He stated that just inside the door of the Colonial Room he was approached by a young man who asked HEALY if he would give the young man the press credentials HEALY had hanging around his neck on a chain. HEALY said that he could not do that and the young man wanted to know what HEALY intended to do with the credentials after the affair was over. HEALY gave him some answer and got rid of him, but noted that the follow was very persistent and even wanted to know where he could get similar credentials.

HEALY did not observe this man again. He recalled the young man's description as follows:

Rafer Johnson was close to him, and Paul Schrade was close behind him. There were also quite a few newsmen close to him. I went through the door and into the kitchen. The hotel help was lined up to shake hands. I saw the Senator extend his hand, but I do not recall seeing him actually touching or shaking hands with anyone. I turned to go back, turning to my left, and as I did I heard the first shot, and then a rapid burst of five or six. While the shots were going, I heard yelling, "Get him." One left (I thought one person had left). I moved forward to the door opening which was to my left and observed the scuffling. Rosie was there grabbing at the suspect. moved over by the ice machine, saw the Senator on the floor, and a fellow kneeling by him. He was a Caucasian. two other fellows kneeling by Schrade. I glanced back by the table, and I could see the scuffling was continuing there. I thought I heard Senator Kennedy say something, but I could not say what it was. I did hear Paul Schrade say, "Take care of the Senator." I did not hear Sirhan make any statements.

Johnson indicated that along with Grier, and other members of Senator Kennedy's campaign group, that he had spent the evening in the Senator's suite on the Fifth Floor at the Ambassador Hotel. When the time came for the Senator to address a group in the Embassy Room, they left the suite and took a service elevator to the kitchen area adjacent to the Embassy Room. The Senator entered the stage via a set of stairs on the left side (left side facing from the stage to the room). Johnson positioned himself on the left side of the stage during the speech.

It was his understanding that at the conclusion of the speech, the Senator was to exit the same way, however, at the conclusion he observed the Senator turn around and go through some curtains at the rear of the stage. Johnson then exited by going through the door immediately next to the stairs on the left side of the stage. The door entered into a foyer area adjacent to the kitchen. Johnson recalled that the room
