
## Mrs. Hoover phoned:



My dear Mr. Secretary:

A Joint Resolution of Congress, approved July 2nd, 1932 authorizes the President to present the Distinguished Flying Cross to Amelia Earhart Putnam. She expects to be at the Ambassador Rotel, Los Angeles, California between July 25th and August 10th. The President will be obliged if you will have the presentation made in his behalf by the military authorities on the West Coast, the time and place being arranged as nearly as possible in accord with her wishes, and a suitable officer being designated to represent the President at the ceremony.
