The Portland Field Office was responsible for the IACB activities in Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho and Nevada. The records in this series are very similar to those created by the other field offices and consist of correspondence to the Central Office and various government agencies, especially the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

g. Cherokee Field Office, 1968-83.

The Cherokee Field Office was responsible for encouraging native arts and crafts of the Eastern Cherokee and Choctaw tribes.

The records in this series include correspondence with the Central Office, other Federal agencies and Indian artisans relating to the encouragement of native arts and crafts among the Eastern Cherokee and Choctaw Indians.

The photographs, some in black and white and others in color, are housed in individual, subject-captioned manila folders. The still pictures, most of which are approximately 8 x 10 inches, document the traditional motifs painted on Blackfeet Indian tipis, which frequently find their themes from the above-mentioned "Napi Legends" and "Blackfeet Tales.e"
