Note: The Final Plans (and subsequent amendments) are proposed as permanent because they provide tracks of the standards used in the past in developing annual direction for timber activities on each National Forest. By 1988 or 1989 these plans will no longer be used because planning data for timber is carried out in a broader forest planning process under the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 and the National Forest Management Act of 1976. It is recommended they be offered to the National and Regional Archives in 1991.
