- N Records that do not appear to have sufficient administrative, legal, research, or other value to warrant their continued preservation by the Government:
- N1 This item consists of case files of civil actions by the United States which grew out of violations of the National Prohibition Act. These records consist primarily of copies of affidavits, complaints, injunctions, orders and decrees of the court, and other formal legal documents, the contents of which are identically duplicated by records in the files of the district court. The remainder of the records consists of related correspondence with defendants and counsel, the Department of Justice, and, occasionally, other Federal departments; investigative reports, chiefly of agents of the Bureau of Prohibition of the Department of Justice; and memoranda and work papers. The contents of the correspondence with and the investigative reports of the Federal departments are identically duplicated by records in the files of these departments. The small quantity of records not identically duplicated elsewhere are believed to be ephemeral in character and of insufficient value to warrant their permanent preservation.
