- N Records that do not appear to have sufficient administrative, legal, research, or other value to warrant their continued preservation by the Government:
- N1 This item consists of case files on conscription matters during World War I, particularly of alleged draft delinquents which appear to have been closed after investigation without prosecutive action. The case files consist principally of copies of investigative reports of field agents of the Division of Investigation (now the F. B. I.), the contents of which are identically duplicated by records in the headquarters files of the Department of Justice. The contents of most of the small quantity of correspondence (chiefly intradepartmental) and related materials are identically duplicated, or summarized or duplicated in substance, in the contents of records in the headquarters files of the Department.
