- N Records that do not appear to have sufficient administrative, legal, research, or other value to warrant their continued preservation by the Government:
- NI These records consist of correspondence principally between the office of the United States attorney and headquarters and field offices of the Departments of Justice and Treasury, together with related materials, concerning matters which did not become court cases, including alleged violations of the internal revenue and other Federal laws which were dropped or closed in a preliminary stage without prosecutive action because of compromise, insufficient evidence, or for other reasons. The related records include reports of Federal investigative agencies, notices of compromise of liabilities, and other papers. Most of these matters appear to have been initiated, investigated, and handled by other Federal agencies, particularly the Treasury Department, and, in general, these records of the United States attorney's office do not show the complete history of, nor all actions taken in, these matters. Any essential information on matters initiated by, or reported to, the Department of Justice are duplicated in the headquarters files of that agency. The contents of the records of matters handled by other Federal agencies, particularly the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Treasury Department, are duplicated in the files of those agencies which possess greater retention value than this item. Records pertaining to complaints, inquiries, and the like of private persons, which are interspersed among these records and which, in general, are not duplicated in Federal files, possess insufficient value to warrant the continued retention of this item.
