Even today, these people remain fearful of government reprisals against family members still living in the Soviet Union. Thus, a significant number of the interviewees did not want their identities known and during the interview they used their first name and last initial only. However, Dr. Mace indicted there were "slips" on some of the audiocassette tapes and the interviewee's full name is provided. He said the transcripts were "cleaned up" to safeguard identities.
